

Shows samples of grain grown in the county that weigh per bushel, wheat, 69½ lbs., barley, 54½ lbs., and oats, 51 lbs. It is rare to meet with so heavy samples of grain as is reported by our correspondent; and although the climate may be rigorous in the extreme, still, judging from the success of the farmers of the state of Maine, in growing bread stuffs, when a liberal bounty was awarded by government, we are favorably impressed, that especially along the seaboard, very productive crops of wheat could be grown.

**OBITUARY.**—We copy the following from the Picou Eastern Chronicle:

"*Melancholy Accident.*—We regret to announce the death by drowning, of JAMES, son of the Rev. John McCurdy, of Miramichi. The accident took place at the Albion Mines, on Monday evening last. He had gone into the river, bathing, although there were no other boys with him, and had unfortunately gone beyond his depth. Some time had elapsed before the alarm was given, and when assistance reached the spot, it was too late to be of any avail; and it was even some time before the body was recovered. Both the parents were absent at the time, and we may imagine their feelings at beholding the boy whom they had left in the morning in all the prattling vivacity of childhood, now stretched a lifeless corpse. The deceased was aged seven years."

We would add a coincidence, in the death of NICHOLAS, eldest son of Mr Peter Walsh, aged 13 years. This lad, accompanied by some others, went into the river to bathe on Sunday evening last, and having ventured beyond his depth immediately disappeared, nor was his body found, notwithstanding the extraordinary industry used, until Tuesday evening, when it was found close by the spot where it had sunk. This lad is represented as having exhibited a considerable degree of talent—he attended the Grammar School, under Mr Millar, and had made good proficiency. Public sympathy was forcibly manifested by the extent and respectability of his funeral, which took place on Wednesday evening. The effect produced by the attendance of Mr Millar and his pupils was very striking.

We sincerely condole with the parents of both these lads in their bereavement.

**AGRICULTURAL.**—A friend in Nova Scotia writes as follows:—"In travelling through Truro and its vicinity, I was very sorry to hear that the wheat, which looks uncommonly well, is almost totally destroyed by the Weevil. A small parcel of the barley in the same district of country, is also slightly affected by this insect. Potatoes throughout Kent and Westmorland promise well. So does hay, which the farmers are busily occupied making."

A Long Island paper reports that the rot has already destroyed a large quantity of potatoes on that Island.
