Melancholy Wrecks and Loss of Life at Richibucto.—During the gale of Saturday and Sunday last the barques Ockbrook, Lawson, master, and Evening Star, Hannah, master, both belonging to Messrs. Holderness and Chilton, while riding at anchor in Richibucto roads were driven ashore and both became total wrecks. A boat from the Evening Star, in endeavouring to reach the shore on Sunday morning with some of the crew, upset, and melancholy to relate, James Dick, chief mate, Arthur Doran, steward, John Jones, seaman, and Walter Farro, an apprentice, were drowned. Captain Hannah and the second mate passed most of the day on Sunday in the mizen rigging, and on Monday morning, with the rest, got safe ashore. The crew of the Ockbrook were all saved. On the above melancholy occasion persons were seen prowling about the shore in search of plunder, and eagerly endeavouring to secure, for their own use, articles that were drifting ashore. It is certainly disgraceful that such things are permitted in a civilized country. Mr Jardine's new ship, the Atlantic, was riding in the roads at the same time, but, though at first she dragged her anchor, yet fortunately she rode over the gale in safety. A survey has since been held on the Ockbrook and Evening Star, and both have been condemned.
