

**OUR ELECTION.**—Last week we announced that the Royal Gazette contained the Proclamation of His Excellency, dissolving the House of Assembly of this Province. The same mail brought the Writs to our Sheriff, and in another page will be found his Notice, stating that "a Court for opening of such Election and nomination of Candidates," will be opened at the Court House, in Newcastle, on Monday, the 5th of October next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon; and in the event of a Poll being then demanded, the same will be opened in the several parishes on Friday the 9th October, at 8 o'clock in the forenoon, which will continue open until 4 in the afternoon.

Our readers are already aware, that this County has the right of returning Four members, and that number of Candidates have entered the field; how many more there will be, we have no means of ascertaining, but it would be a matter of congratulation if the Freeholders could, on the first day, decide on the parties they wish to be returned, and save the country the turmoil and ill-feeling which will be engendered if a contest ensues.

Why this matter has been so long delayed, and when decided upon, the constituency so hurried in deciding on so vitally-important a measure, we are unable to divine. We think the Executive deserve but little credit for the manner in which they have disposed of this business, particularly as it puts the officers in the distant parts of the Province to considerable difficulty and extra expense in making their arrangements; and we question much, if they can perform the business in strict accordance with the law.

**THE REV. DEMPSTER WALLACE.**—The above Reverend Gentleman, a Missionary from the Church of Scotland, to the adjacent settlements, came passenger in the last Royal Mail Steamer. The Reverend Gentleman preached two excellent Discourses at Halifax on last Lord's Day, arrived here by the mail yesterday, and will officiate to-morrow in St. Andrew's Church, at the usual hour.

**THE SEASON.**—A change has at length come over the monotony of the long drought—copious showers of rain have been falling all the morning, which must gladden the hearts of the farmers and mill-owners.

**P. E. ISLAND.**—The Charlotte Town Royal Gazette of the 15th inst., contains the following paragraph:—

"On the night of Friday last, a melancholy accident in our harbour, resulting in the death of Angus McQuarrie, of De Sable, who with his brother John, had been spending the evening on board the Schooner *Armada*, belonging to Charles McQuarrie, brother to the deceased which vessel is running as a regular Packet during the present season, between this Port Miramichi. The deceased was missed on the morning of Saturday, his hat only being found on the deck, and during the whole of that day and the forenoon of Sunday, the adjoining waters were dragged, until the body of the deceased was recovered in the neighborhood of the Queen's Wharf, not far from the spot where the vessel lay. An inquest was held the body yesterday, before Daniel Hodgson, Esquire, Coroner of Queen's County, which occupied eight hours, and several witnesses including Dr. Mackieson, in his medical capacity were examined. From the evidence it was manifest that the deceased, who was very much intoxicated on the night in question, had accidentally fallen from the deck of the schooner. No marks of violence were conspicuous.
