

Matane, and will be a total wreck. Capt. Miller and his crew had got up to Mitis, from which place Capt. M. writes, and where he is laid up with a sprained ankle. The Wm. Bayard is ashore 15 miles below Little Matane. The flour in her was still safe, although the larboard broadside was out—it would be landed as soon as the ice was sufficiently strong to bear it. There is little chance of saving the rigging or any of her materials, unless it be in the spring—her masts, which were cut away, are lying alongside of her under the ice. The mate and one man have remained by the wreck to prevent her being plundered. Capt. M. states that his men have been dreadfully frostbitten, and one, he fears, will lose his life.

The following is an extract of a letter received here yesterday, by Messrs. Tetu & Co. Jated River Ouelle, 23rd Dec. 1845:—

"A boat, from Green Island, with fifteen men on board, got fast in the ice, and every soul on board perished.

"It is also reported that 15 seamen have been found frozen to death on Red Island."

**Nova Scotia:**

Halifax Guardian, January 2.

On Wednesday morning soon after midnight a fire broke out in the building in Barrington-Street, occupied as a workshop by Mr. James Stewart, Carpenter, which speedily communicated to the adjoining tenement, owned and partly occupied by Mrs. Murphy, and thence to the Furniture Warehouse and extensive workshops owned and occupied by Messrs. Thompson & Esson, all of which were consumed, the adjacent buildings, on each side, being with difficulty saved by the strenuous and united exertions of the Fire Wardens, the Engine, Fire, and Axe Companies, the Military and Civilian exertions which were above all praise. Messrs. Thompson & Esson are insured, we understand, to the extent of £400 on their stock, and £200 on their premises, but will be considerable sufferers notwithstanding. Mr. Murphy's loss is covered to the extent of £300; and Mr. Barry, kept a shop in the ground floor of the premises owned by Mrs. M. has insurance effected to the amount of £150. Mr. Stewart, we fear is uninsured. Providentially the weather at the time when this calamity occurred, was perfectly calm, otherwise, from the combustible nature of the stock in the burning buildings, it is impossible to say how far the conflagration might have extended. It is a subject of considerable public interest, and one which should render the occupants of such buildings particularly cautious, that no fewer than four or five fires have occurred, within a short period, in the workshops of different Carpenters in this City.

**Murder.**—A soldier of the Reserve Battalion of the Rifle Brigade, named Campbell, while scrubbing out one of the Barrack Rooms on Christmas Eve, was so irritated by his wife, who it is said was in liquor, that he struck her over the head with a broom handle, which blow caused her death. A Coroner's Inquest was held on the body, and a verdict accordingly returned. The unhappy man has been lodged in gaol to await his trial for murder.
