YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

From papers, by this mail we condense the following items of news.

Mexico.—On the 1st inst. Santa Anna at the head of 2000 cavalry, and 3 pieces of artillery, sallied out to attack the American trains. He reached Perote on the 4th ult., and soon after all his men except 130 hussars pronounced against him, accusing him of incapacity, attributing all the late disasters to him. With these adherents he retired to recruit, and again attack the enemy.

Newfoundland.—Accounts from this Island report that the Potato crop had almost entirely failed, and in consequence of which the distress previously existing in the districts had been greatly aggravated.

The Railway.—The Editor of the Loyalist says:—We are sorry to learn that the engineers now surveying the great Trunk Line of Railway have abandoned the approach to the Grand Falls as impracticable. Two routes are now being surveyed, both of them crossing the Restigouche River; the upper route crossing the Tobique about 35 miles from its mouth.

St. John Courier, November, 6. Our NEW GOVERNOR—Sir Edmund Walker read, M. A., of Hermitage, Kent (Eng.) was born in 1795; succeeded as 8th Barone

upon the death of his father in 1838 who was the Reverend Sir John Head, M. A., perpetual curate of Egerton, in Kent, and Rector of Raleigh, in Essex; Sir Edmund married on the 27th Nov. 1838 Anna Maria, daughter of the late Rev. Philip Yorke, grandson of the first Earl of Hardwick, Sir Francis Bond Head, late Governor of Canada is connected with Sir, Edmund, collaterally.

PAUPER EMIGRANTS.—The Common Council have appointed a committee to make arrangements with the master of the Ship Aeolus, respecting the unfortunate emigrate on board that vessel, sent out by Lord Palmerston, of whom every care will be taken consistent with public safety. The Quarantine Establishment on Patridge Island was broken up this week, and the emigrants removed to the Alms House Hospital, except a very few, who were to ill to be removed with safety. These remain under charge of a medical man, and are waited upon by McGowan, the Steward, who with his wife remains on the Island—New Brunswick.

Admiralty—Court of Special Commission—The Queen against William McGuire—For Murder on the High Seas.—The Court of Special Commission for the trial of this offence opened at ten o'clock this morning; and the Prisoner, who required three men to place him at the bar, was exceedingly boisterous, and talked loudly and incoherently. After being placed at the bar, his violence subsided, and he appeared to awake to some consciousness of his position. The Jury without leaving the box, returned a verdict of 'unsound mind, and not capable of defending himself.—Halifax Courier.
