

adjacent liberal cantons. Those from Zug desert to Zurich; those from Lucerne fraternise with Zurich and Argau. A hundred men with their officers, had passed the frontier to Zurich.

According to the last despatches, it is affirmed that all efforts of an amicable adjustment having failed, the Diet had passed a decree for the immediate execution of measures of compulsion against the Sonderbund.

Fog in London.—At six o'clock last evening a thick fog enveloped the metropolis, which became so dense that as it grew late pedestrians had to be provided with flambeaux, and the omnibuses and cabs, although they had lights, could only creep along, as otherwise there was every danger of their coming in collision with each other. The police were kept particularly busy by the light fingered, who availed themselves of the golden opportunity that the darkness afforded them to follow their avocations.

Ireland.—Dublin, Nov. 1.—The Irish members are to meet to-morrow, at the Rotunda, for the despatch of divers and sundry important matters; and on Thursday the 'Irish Council' meet at the same place, for the accomplishment of the same objects. The meeting to-morrow will be more of a preliminary nature than otherwise, for the Irish parliament, in imitation of the larger establishment in Palace yard, mean to adjourn from day to day till all the business is disposed of.

Chester and Holyhead.—One of the great iron tubes to form the bridge over the river Conway is completed, and the operations for raising it to the intended site, adjacent to the walls of Conway castle, will be commenced in the course of the present month. It exceeds 1,000 tons in weight, being 400 feet long, and 30 feet in height. It now stands on a platform overhanging the Conway. It is intended to float it in a mass down the river, on pontoons, and raise it bodily on to the abatments by means of hydraulic presses. The event is looked forward to with much interest by engineers.

Trade with India.—A meeting was held on Tuesday evening at the Eastern Institution, Commercial-road, to hear an address from Mr. G. Thompson, M. P., relative to the industrial resources of India and the causes which retard their development. The chair was taken by Mr. Francis Carnic Brown. After a lengthened address it was resolved, that it is the duty of the people of England, for the sake alike of England, of India, and of the enslaved throughout the world to require of the legislature the immediate removal of all impediments which depress the agricultural energies of the native population; and the institution of a strict and impartial inquiry, in India, into the condition of the natives, and into the conduct and the acts arising out of the peculiar government ruling over them, which effect their well being, and retard their posterity.—M. W. Howitt seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously, and the meeting separated.

A warrant published in the London Gazette of the 19th Oct., directs certain alterations in the rates of postage, and among others orders that on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight transmitted by packet between the islands of Martinique and Guadeloupe and British North America, a uniform rate of four pence shall be charged; and that a local rate of one penny shall be charged on all letters transmitted through the post between any two places in the Island of Hong Kong. These rates are widely different from the exorbitant charges at present exacted in the North American Provinces.

The Famine Relief Service Again.—Preparations are being made for again entering upon the services at her Majesty's several victualling establishments at the home ports, where vessels have already commenced loading with food and grain to carry to those districts where dearth is again likely to prevail. Two vessels are loading at the Royal Clarence Victualling Establishment, Gosport; and upwards of half a dozen are loading at the Royal William Establishment. This is certainly taking time by the forelock, but we trust there will be no necessity for the outpourings from our granaries to fill or replenish those of our neighbours, which was done to such an impoverishing extent last year and the beginning of the present. No philanthropic mind can do otherwise than applaud the preparation for timely succour in the hour of need, but let us not hasten that calamitous time by a seeming too sensitiveness with regard to its probability. A number of officers, upwards of 100, have already been appointed upon the relief commission.
