A letter from the capital says :- On the morn ing of the 14th, the American army entered the city in a quiet manner. Gen. Scott had al-ready reached the Palace, when suddenly the rabble commenced throwing stores upon the American troops from the tops of the houses, and from all along the streets; while the bet. ter classes were firing from windows, balco-ntes, &c. Gen. Scott ordered pieces of artill lery to be placed in all directions, and soon swept the streets with grape shot.
