

SOUTHERN MAIL.

From papers received by the mail yesterday afternoon, we extract the following items of news.

St. John Courier, Feb. 22.

Of the above amount, £100 sterling will be emitted by the Mail to-day to the Provost of Edinburgh, to be distributed among the most destitute in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, according to his judgment and directions; and the remainder forwarded agreeably to the annexed resolution, passed at a meeting of the Committee, held at the Mayor's Office, on Monday last:

Resolved, that the amount of money apportioned for Ireland be forthwith remitted to the Lord Lieutenant, with suggestions from the Chairman of this Committee, that the money was contributed by the inhabitants of this City and County, for the purpose affording relief to the suffering poor in that country—and it is particularly desired, that it be distributed among the most destitute, with as little delay as possible.

In addition to the above, the St. Andrew's and Highland Societies of this City remit £300 sterling by Mail to-day; St. John's Lodge of Freemasons £50 sterling, and Hibernian Lodge, £25 currency. The remittances to Ireland from individuals, through the Bank of British North America, by this day's mail amount we understand, to not less than £1083.

St. Andrews and Woodstock Railroad.—We understand that the Railroad committee of the Assembly have recommended that the Province guarantee three per cent. interest on £100,000 for ten years after the road is in full operation, and a grant of 50,000 acres of land, under certain restrictions of settlement, besides the land necessary for the road. With such inducements, and the prospect of a large emigration the ensuing season, the work will no doubt be undertaken in good earnest early in the spring.
