THE WAR.

When our own nation is at war with another nation, the natural impulse of the heart is to uphold our own side and to believe that we are right. This is natural, and, as a general principle, it is a good impulse. Yet this should never obtain such mastery over our feelings as to wrap our reason, and make us blindly follow whatever a corrupt military fanaticism would lead. If our nation is invaded, if our right upon the land or sea are usurped by a foreign power, there should be no hesitation, and there would be none, as to what is our duty as patriots and freemen. We should defend what is our own, let the consequences be what they would. A nation which would tamely submit to wrong or insult, when it had even the shadow of a power to resist it, would be unworthy of being a nation. The fact would be evidence of the craven spirit of its people, and the miserable character for its institutions and laws, such as the history of the world bears few records of.

Nearly all the wars which this world has witnessed, have had their origin in the grasping avarice, which is called ambition, of one nation, to obtain possession of that which was the property of another and a weaker nation. Injustice and crime, which are embodied in wrongful wars, and which stalk abroad over the land, fertile in deed of violence, unrebuked, are hidden from the masses who remain at home by the visions of conquest, the glory of battles fought and won, and the rich spoils, wrung, robber-like, from the defeated, by the strong arm of the triumphant and victorious General. Could we but see the miseries which war create—the burnt dwellings, the sacked towns and cities, the wasted corn-fields, the maimed, the dying and the dead, the brutality of an unlicensed soldiery, the desolation of women and children, the life's blood oozing from the heart of the stricken down peasant, freezing as it flows, and fastening him to the earth in its congealed mass—we would consider the cruelty of the savage beasts of the forests as merciful, when compared with the sanguinary deed of CHRISTIAN man.

Such are a few of the natural consequences of war. Such scenes are exhibited on every battle field, and form one grand panorama in the march of an invading army, and it is these which give to a war of aggression, its sublime guilt, and makes its authors the most criminal of men. Yet there are those who would punish with stripes and imprisonment the poor wretch in the land, who, to satisfy the cravings of hunger, should steal a shilling's worth of bread from those who had plenty and to spare, and, at the same time, they would exalt to the skies, and enshrine with an immortal halo the men who would involve needlessly, two nations in war. The people should understand these matters, and we believe, in a great measure, they do. The war with Mexico is an aggressive war, if there ever was one in the world.
