

DEPUTATION FROM THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—The Rev. Mr Fowler, of Ratho, and the Rev. Mr. Mackintosh, of Aberdeen, two of the deputation from the Established Church of Scotland, who are now on a visit to the North American Provinces, arrived in this city last Saturday evening from Fredericton. The former gentleman officiated in St. Andrew's church on Sunday evening, and again on Monday evening, and after delivering a very excellent sermon, he explained to the congregation the object of the mission to these colonies, the desire being that peace and good will should prevail, and that the spiritual wants of the people should be supplied; he also spoke very encouragingly of the present state and prospects of the Church of Scotland.—The other member of the Deputation, the Rev. Mr. Stevenson, of Dalry, preached in Fredericton on Sunday, and arrived in town on Monday evening, accompanied by the Rev. Mr. Brook, Minister of St. Paul's church Fredericton.

On Wednesday morning the Rev. gentlemen composing the Deputation took their departure in the Western Mail stage for St Andrews, to visit the several parishes in Charlotte county.

We understand that one of the deputation, (most probable the Rev. Mr. Stevenson) will return to this city and preach in St. Andrew's church, tomorrow, (Sunday,) at seven o'clock, a. m. and in St. Stephen's at six in the evening.

MEXICO.—The St. John Courier puts in possession of the following important information from this country.

By the Western Mail last evening we received accounts of General Scott having entered the city of Mexico on the 17th July, with the loss of about 200 men. Our papers this morning by the steamer Herald from Eusport, which are down to Thursday last, being two days later than those by last evening's mail, do not confirm this important rumour. We subjoin extracts.

An extra from the New Orleans National, says that General Scott entered the City of Mexico on the 17th July. The news is said to have been brought by a carrier (probably British Courier) to Vera Cruz. The National states that General Scott met with no opposition until within eight miles of the capital; that there he had a battle in which the American loss was about 200, and that of the Mexicans heavy; after which the Mexicans gave way.

The La Patria (Spanish paper published at New Orleans) has a letter from Mexico, which states that General Scott was within eight leagues of the city of Mexico. Na Commissioners had been appointed.

It is stated that a train from Carmargo for Monterey, was attacked by a Mexican force under Gen. Urrea, and 80 pack mules, with \$30,000 belonging to merchants, was captured.

A Boston paper of Thursday says— "We have nothing farther from the South, in regard to the reported capitulation of the city of Mexico, with the exception of some speculations by La Patria of the 1st inst. printed at New Orleans, which says three days elapsed between the arrival of the Washington and the publication of the news in the National. It further says, that Gen. Scott must have left Puebla by the 11th or 12th, to have reached Mexico by the 15th, whereas all the letters received by the Washington state that he would not leave before the 15th."

Latest from Tampico.—By the arrival of the schooner Mary from New Orleans, advices have been received from Tampico to the 26th ult. but no confirmation of the reported occupation of the capital. General Taylor remained at Walnut Springs as late as the 17th July. His whole command numbered seven thousand men. He would march upon San Luis as soon as reinforced by 2000 fresh troops. A rumor prevailed at Monterey, as early as the 13th of July, that Gen Scott had defeated a large body of the Mexicans near the Capital. This was supposed to be the origin of the rumor at Matamoras a few days later.

WESLEYAN MISSIONS.—The Rev. Mr. Wood, and the Rev. Samuel Rice, accompanied by their families, left Saint John in the steamer Admiral, on Wednesday, for Portland, on their way to Canada West.

The Fredericton Reporter informs us, that the first named gentleman received from his numerous friends in St John an Address, and an elegant Gold Watch, and adds, "he takes with him, however,

what must be more accordant with his feelings, the love of his own people—the respect of all."

The St. John Albion of Saturday, in speaking of the latter gentleman says:—

The Rev. S. D. Rice, Wesleyan Missionary, departed from this city with the Rev. Mr. Wood. As a young Minister of the Gospel, Mr. Rice has been active and faithful in his holy calling. His mild, unostentatious, and amiable deportment, has won for him many friends of all denominations; whilst the zeal he has manifested in the dissemination of scriptural truths, has justly entitled him to the affectionate remembrance of all who have had the opportunity of profiting by his instructions.

BRITISH AND AMERICAN POST OFFICE. The St John Courier contains the following highly important piece of news:

We learn from an article in the official paper at Washington, that the United States Post Master General has given notice to the British Post Master General, for the abrogation, at the expiration of ninety days, of the contract under which the British Mails by the Canada Steamers, are transmitted from Boston to Canada. This step has been taken in consequence of Letters by the American steamer Washington, intended for transmission in the British Islands being charged in England with the Foreign postage, in addition to the inland, in the same manner as if they had been conveyed in the British Mail Steamers or otherwise; while the letters for Canada landed at Boston, from these vessels, are forwarded in bulk at considerably less than the established rates of postage, and the six cents each on foreign letters landed at the United States seaports are not charged upon them.

PRINCE ED. ISLAND.—The Royal Gazette published at Charlottetown, gives the annexed flattering account of the state of the Revenue of this Island.

NOVASCOTIA.—The papers furnish us with some further intelligence relating to the Elections in this Province. We copy the following paragraphs from the Post of Saturday last, the latest paper.

By the Mail yesterday we learn that the Hon. Solicitor General has been returned by a majority of 300—a convincing proof of the esteem in which the base slanders against him in the Cape Breton Spectator have been held by the good people of Sydney.

We learn also that Harrington has been returned by a majority of 65 over Brymer and that the return in the contest between Le Viscombe and Martell exhibits a tie. So we suppose the race will have to be run over again.

From Inverness we understand that Young and Smith have been returned.

We have now all the returns from the whole Province. They exhibit 22 Conservatives, 18 Radicals, and 10 moderate men, at least of whom will probably give their support to the Government. The return for Richmond is not counted in the above.

POINT DE BUTE.—We obtained a letter from a correspondent at this place, dated on the 14th inst., from which we take the following extract:—

"The Election in the adjoining County of Cumberland, terminated in favour of the Conservatives, viz., the two old Members for the County, Messrs Dickey & Fulton; and for the Township of Amherst, White Bent, Esq. The Candidates on the Liberal side, who opposed them for the County were Messrs McFarlane & Lewis, and for the Township, Thomas Logan, Esq., former member. The state of the Poll at the close was as follows: Conservative Party.—County.

Every thing passed off quietly, much to the satisfaction of both parties.

The hay crop in this section of the County, is very much injured by the heavy rains during the last week, on account of so much being cut down. There is one farmer here, in Point de Bute, has between 35 and 40 tons mowed. Potatoes look remarkably well, wheat in places is hurt by the weevil, oats, buckwheat, &c. look well."

LATE FROM CANTON.—By the arrival of the Sea Witch, we have Canton dates to the 3rd of May. Her passage to New York—eighty one days—is said to be the shortest on record.

The Canton papers are mainly occupied with accounts of the late attacks made by the English and French forces, the origin of which difficulty is given in the favour of our correspondent, annexed hitherto. The market is much deranged in consequence of these expeditions; and many of the capitalists have removed their money—being apprehensive of another invasion. Opium has fallen in price in consequence. Cotton goods has also declined in price. As the season advances, an improvement in cotton goods is anticipated, and the stock—almost 310,000 pieces—will be sold at stiff prices.
