At a recent meeting in Cork, in connexion with the existing distress, it was stated that the very Rev. Theobald Mathew has for some time past, been feeding 2 persons a day.

DEATH OF DOCTOR VONDY.

We last week announced the illness of Dr. VONDY, the Health Officer at the Lazaretto; and it is our painful duty this day to record his death. He fell a sacrifice to that alarming disease with which the passengers of the ill-fated ship *Looshtauk* were visited, and expired on Friday morning last, about 8 o'clock. His remains were placed in a double coffin, made perfectly air tight, and conveyed from Middle Island to Coulson's slip, and from thence to St. Paul's Churchyard, followed by an immense concourse of people.

We have seldom witnessed an occurrence that cast so deep a gloom over the community. As soon as his death was announced, all the shops were closed, and business partially suspended throughout the day. The sum of £60 was subscribed in the churchyard, for the purpose of erecting a suitable testimonial to commemorate the sad event, and testify the respect felt for the memory of the deceased.

We sincerely sympathize with the parents and relations of this rising man, whose mild and gentlemanly bearing, and unassuming manner, endeared him to all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. Dr. Vondy was in the 27th year of his age.

News by Yesterday's Mail.

ST. JOHN.—*Quarantine Report*—We have been favored with a list of the deaths in Hospital on Partridge Island, from the 7th of May up to the 2nd instant, amounting, in all, to 174. Their names, and ages, with the names of the vessels from which they were landed, we shall publish next week, for the information of their friends in Ireland. The deaths were principally from Typhus Fever and Dysentery. The total number of sick landed this season was 847. In addition to this number twenty-four sick and debilitated—not severe cases—were landed yesterday from the ship John Claiborne and brig Garland now at quarantine. Although the number of cases that have proved fatal have been large, yet, considering

the mortality among emigrants, this season, at other ports, particularly at Miramichi and Quebec, it must be confessed that the reports that have been circulated from time to time of the deaths at Partridge Island, have been greatly exaggerated; and for the purpose of preventing such gross misrepresentation in the future, we shall endeavour to procure and publish further official reports for the time to come.

With respect to the supplies furnished to, and treatment of the emigrants on board the vessels and on shore, at Quarantine, many equally unfounded reports have been circulated. Under all the circumstances, the wants of these unfortunate people have been as well attended to, perhaps, as could be expected. The Health Officer, (Dr. G. J. Harding) it is well known, has had a most arduous and responsible duty to perform, even with the assistance of two medical practitioners, Dr. W. S. Harding and Dr. Collins: but these gentlemen being both attacked with fever soon after they proceeded to the Island, the whole duties of the Medical establishment have for the most part been conducted by Dr. G. J. Harding alone. His orders for the necessary supplies for the sick have been promptly supplied by the proper authorities, and too much praise cannot be awarded to His Worship the Mayor and Mr. Alderman Smith for their active personal exertions in the cause of suffering humanity. Bonds have been required from, and given by, the agents of the several vessels for the supply of provisions for the healthy, while kept at the station for observation and investigation.

Nor have the spiritual wants of the sick and dying been unattended to—the Rev. Mr. Quin, to whose Church the great bulk of the passengers belongs, has, we understand, been very assiduous in his visits to them.

Reports of impositions upon the emigrants by the boatmen in the employ of the Corporation, have been circulated, but no case has been brought in a tangible shape before the authorities; and as they directed a discontinuance of the charge for conveying emigrants from Partridge Island to the City, we trust we shall hear no more on this head, and that all classes will unite in their endeavours to alleviate the suffering of the many miserable beings who have found their way to our shores, this season, in search of a livelihood.

It is with deep regret we announce to-day the death of Dr. Collins, which took place yesterday afternoon at the Quarantine Station at this port. This young gentleman having recently returned from Europe, after completing his Medical studies, commenced the practice of his profession in this City last summer, and was much respected by the community generally for his talents, and gentlemanly deportment. In company with Dr. W. S. Harding, he proceeded a few weeks ago to Partridge Island, for the purpose of assisting the resident Health Officer, Dr. G. J. Harding, in the discharge of his onerous duties, and in the exercise of this benevolent determination, contracted Typhus fever, which, proving fatal in his case, has deprived the City of a promising member of the Medical profession, and his young wife and many relatives of a loving husband and sincere friend.

Dr. W. S. Harding, who was also attacked with fever, is now, happily, recovering—*Courier*, July 8.

PICTOU.—The 'Mayflower' has been discharged from quarantine, all the cases of small pox having determined favourably, but the present aspect of affairs with respect to the fever at the quarantine station, affords ground for serious alarm. Up to last night 80, had died, amongst these are Mr. Thomas Connell, (who had been employed partly as a nurse, and partly as a carpenter in making coffins for the dead,) who died on Friday last, and a colored man, who died on Monday evening last; both of these deaths took place in this town. There are besides these, 15 cases of the fever in town, and among these we regret to say, that Drs. Anderson and Johnson, whose attention and labours among the emigrants have been most indefatigable, are numbered. The aspect of the disease in their case, is by no means a trifling one, but it has not yet come to its crisis. Under these circumstances the Board of Health were obliged to apply to the Government for medical assistance.

To this request they promptly responded, and with an alacrity that calls for the thanks of the community despatched Dr. Gilpin who arrived here on Sunday last. It is scarcely fair to impute any blame to the Board of Health, under all the circumstances of this painful occurrence, but the general opinion in the community is, that they acted very injudiciously, in permitting those who attended on the sick, to have any intercourse with the town.

Could this arrangement have been adopted, there would have been little danger of the present unfortunate state of matters having occurred for we believe all the cases which have broke out in town, can be traced to some immediate intercourse with the emigrants.—*Eastern Chronicle*, July 1.

CANADA.—Two Men Hung for Murder—Six Murders Confessed!—Two men were executed for murder, at Toronto, Canada, on Tuesday the 22nd June. The name of one was Hamilton, and that of the other, Turner. The former was hung for the murder of an old man, with whom he had some difficulty, in settling which, as he asserted upon the scaffold, they got into a quarrel, and coming to blows, he hit the old man on the head and killed him. These facts he stated just previous to the rope being placed around his neck.

Turner seems to have been a hardened and

desperate villain. Some time since he murdered a man while engaged in a row. Previous to his being executed, he came out upon the scaffold and addressed the assembled thousands present in a speech of half an hour or more, in the course of which he acknowledged that the murder for which he was about to suffer the penalty of the law, was the sixth which he had committed in the course of a few years!

So great was the desire to witness the hanging of the two men, that it was utterly impossible to do any business whatever in Toronto. Men, women, and children, flocked around the scaffold by thousands.—*Newbrunswick*, July 1.
