## Notice to Owners &amp; Tenants

Occupying Buildings of TWO or more stories high, in the Town of Chatham. Passed 11th April, 1846: 9th Victoria, Chap. 41. Section 18. And be it enacted, That every person owning a building in the said Town of Newcastle and Chatham, or either of them, of two or more stories in height, shall provide himself with a good and sufficient LADDER, to lay on the top, and hold at the top by two substantial Iron Hooks, fastened to the end of such Ladder, which shall extend down the roof of the house to the eaves; and in case of absence or non-residence of the owner of any such building or buildings in the said towns, or either of them, the said tenant or tenants occupying the same, shall, at the expense of his or their landlord, provide such Ladders for every building; which Ladder every owner or occupier of such house shall keep stationary on the roof thereof.

The Firewards of the Town of Chatham Give Notice, that Ladders must be placed on the houses according to the 18th section of the Act of the Assembly, and that all persons have the Ladders put on immediately.
