Ballie, and on the faith of which he returned to office:—And your committee can discover no fice:—And your committee can discover no action the part of the government, altering or affecting this agreement; nor does it appear to your committee that Mr Ballie has done any act to impair his right to have such agreement act to impair his right to have such agreement carried out; but they are of opinion that the whole subject would have been investigated and adjusted by the government:—That to avoid misconception of their opinion as to the salary that ought to be attached to the office of Surveyor General, your committee most respectfully state, that in their opinion the sum of six hundred pounds currency is an adequate compensation for discharging the duties devolving upon that officer; and if the question of determining the salary for the office of Surveyor General had been referred to them, irrespective of any compact or agreement with the Government, they would have fixed

that that amount.

Mexican News.

Halifax Sun, April 14. MEXICAN 'NEWS.

The Brig Acadian, which arrived on Monday morning in 24 days from Bos-ton, brought late papers, and later ac-counts from Mexico. If we can place any faith in the rumours given, continued "glorious success crowns the American Arms." But the accounts are, and have been, so contradictory, and in some instances so utterly unfounded in truth, that it behoves us, not to encumber our pages with notices of hostile movements, skirmishes, and battles, which are not well vouched for by competent authori-ty. The Southern Newsmongers, and correspondents of the Northern Journals speculate on the pockets of the public, by manufacturing Startling News by Express,' and 'Electric Telegraph,' and are making money, by the disreputable practice. We should be imposing on our readers, were we to follow the practice here, and cry out Great news from Mexico—another battle fought,— whenever one of these American Catch-peany prints should stray to our shores. Therefore, if we do not always give in ' The Sun,' with a great flourish of

Trumpets, and large heading, 'Impor-tant News from Mexico,'—as contained in the columns of contemporary periodiin the columns of contemporary periodi-cals, it is for the reasons above stated In turning to the news, as now before us, there is little we think that may be relied on, beyond what has been officially communicated. One thing is clearly evident, taking even American accounts of the hostile operations in Mexico, and we must bear in mind that we hear but one side of every story, that the American army has not made that progress nor can army has not made that progress nor those conquests which our too sanguine neighbours thought it would. The Mexicans, poorly paid, and fed, and clad, and miserable as they are, have proved themselves brave and enduring soldiers throughout the campaign, and the best proof of this is that excepting the taken proof of this is, that, excepting the taking of a few insignificent outposts, at a cost of many lives, and millions of money, the invading army has accomplished comparatively nothing. Thousands of volunteers and regular troops that marched into Mexco, tull of hope speedily to revel in the 'Halls of the Montezumas,' have bit the dust, in bloody battle, or been swept away by the malignant fevers of the country, ere they crossed the RioGrande, or struck one blow for Glory and in defence of the Banner of 'Stars

and stripes.' The battle of 'Bueno Vista,' in which General Taylor says he encountered, with 5,400 troops under his command, chiefly volunteers, 20,000 Mexicans! proved most disastrous to both armies, but particularly so to the American army. A list of the killed and wounded, my. A list of the killed and wounded, numbering 740, and occupying two close columns, is given in the Washington 'Union,' one whole company of Cavalry cut off besides, not being included, swelling the number to at least 1,000, or nearly one fifth of the whole American force! The Mexicans had 20,000 in the field, says General Taylor, and 'from the statement of Mexican officers, partithe statement of Mexican officers, particularly of the medical staff left to succour the wounded there seems no doubt that their loss in the recent action is moderately estimated at 1500 and may reach 2000 men, killed and wounded, beside 2000 or 3000 deserters" It will be seen, then that by the statement of the American Commander-in-Chief himself, who writes from Augua Nueva, recently the Head Quarters of Santa Anna, that the advantage, as to the proportionate number of killed and wounded, is on the side of the Mexicans.

Santa Anna is in full retreat upon San Luis, his army being in a very disorganized state, and dying in large numbers daily, from starvation. This is the language of General Taylor, and may or may not be true, coming from an enemy. Various accounts are given however, by which it would appear that the American force is completely encompassed by the Mexicans. Certain it is that General Taylor has been unable or unwilling to follow his advantages-if such he real-
