Quarantine.—Of the vessels before reported at quarantine, the barques Alderbaran, Pallas, and Governor Douglas, and the brigs Mary, Dealy, and Thorny Close, and the brigantine Mary, still remain.

Electric Telegraph.—It is stated in the Quebec Mercury of the 5th inst. that a contract has been closed by the British North American Electric Telegraph Association for the construction of the line to the confines of New-Brunswick.

The first regiment of Tennessee volunteers, which entered the service a year ago, a thousand strong, has just arrived at New-Orleans numbering only three hundred and fifty.

Brazil and Buenos Ayres.—A letter from Rio de Janeiro, dated the 24th April, states that the blockade of Buenos Ayres has been abandoned, and the European ministers, daily expected, it was generally thought, would cede to Rosas all he asked.

Tahiti.—Conquered at last.—Advices from the French Governor (Brual) of the Georgian Islands, on the 1st January, say that on the 17th of the previous month, the fort of Fautahua, which had been deemed impregnable, was carried by the French with their native allies.

It was fully expected at Tahiti that the Queen will also yield, as her husband has long been urging her to do so. The next bone of contention will be the Society Islands, all of which the French claim Sovereignty over, on the plea that they were all a long contributory to the Georgian Islands, now in their possession.

Picou.—Small Fox.—Two more cases have taken place on board of the Mayflower. The health officer went on board on Monday last for the purpose of releasing her from quarantine, when these two cases were discovered.

Immense loss of Life in China.—The Chinese Repository gives an account which could hardly be credited, had we not positive proofs of the density of the population of the Chinese empire.

Great Conflagration in Bucharest.—On the 4th of April, one of the most dreadful fires which are the curse of Turkey, broke out in Bucharest, the capital of Wallachia. It was blowing a violent South east wind at the time and the fire after raging most intensely for twenty four hours, ceased for want of fuel, having consumed in its progress upwards of two thousand houses and twenty seven public establishments.
