Quarantine .- Of the vessels before reported at quarantine, the barques Alderbaran, Pallas, and Governor Douglas, and the brigs Mary, Dealy, and Thorny Close, and the brigantine Mary, still remain. Most of them, we understand, will so on be released. The passengers stand, will soon be released. The passengers on board the brigastine Eaterprise, from Kinsale, and Eliza & Anne, from Galway, which came to anchor at the quarantine ground yes terday, being all in good health, will only be detained a short time for observation. The number of deaths on board the vessels and on shore at quarantine, up to yesterday, amount to 143. About five thousand passengers have already arrived the present season.

Electric Telegraph.—It is stated in the Quebec Mercury of the 5th inst. that a contract has been closed by the British North American Electric Telegraph Association for the construction of the line to the confines of New-Brunswick. Mr. Ezra Cornell, of Ithaca, (N. Y.) agent for the construction of the Troy and Canada Junction Telegraph Company, has undertaken the work, which will be commenced without delay. will be commenced without delay.

The first regiment of Tennessee volunteers, which entered the service a year ago, a thousand strong, has just arrived at New-Orieans numbering only three kundred and fifty. The others have laid their bones in Mexico—and

Brazil and Buenos Ayres.—A letter from Rio de Janeiro, dated the 24th April, states that the blockade of Buenos Ayres has been abandoned, and the European ministers, daily expected, it was generally thought, would cede to Rosas all he asked. This being the case makes war with Buenos Ayres and Brazil inevitable, and active preparations were accordingly in progress.

The French admiral has instructions not to insist on their possession for the present, and and it is hoped that their independence will be acknowledged by the English Government, and acquised in by that of France.

Immense loss of Life in China.—The Chinese Repository gives an account which could hardly be credited, had we not positive proofs of the density of the population of the Chinese empire. A civil war, or rather feud, took place between the two neighbouring departments of Chang-Chao and Tschan-Chao, in the Province of Gokien, in which 24,515 houses and 688 huts were pillaged and burnt to the ground, and 130,632 persons killed and woundd. It appears that wars of this kind are of frequent occurence in the interior of this country, without the Government attempting, or caring to interfere. It is stated that when nots of this discription take place, bearing no political character, the authorities care little about the result to the inhabitants. It is not long since the authorities of Canton allowed two villages to be destroyed, and the populatwo villages to be destroyed, and the popula-tion murdered, as the question was only cer-lain losses at gaming. The empire, say they, is too thickly populated, therefore there can be no barm in allowing turbulent people to make room for a more quiet set.

Great Conflagration in Bucharest .- On the the of April, one of the most dreadful fires which are the curse of Torkey, broke out in Bucharest, the capital of Wallachia. It was blowing a violent South east wind at the time and the fire after raging most intensely for twenty four hours, ceased for want of fuel, ha-ving consumed in its progress upwards of two thousand houses and twenty seven public es-lablishments. The loss of property is immease, and has been variously estimated at £1,000,000 to 2,500,000. To account for this apparently exaggerated loss, it is necessary to mention that not a single stone count-ing house or fireproof magazine resisted the intense fury of the flames.
