

instead of by day work. They assembled armed with their tools, cut off the communications, broke the waggons, trucks, and other machineries, and finally destroyed the tools themselves. It was only by the intervention of the troops that this emute was quelled. Bread-riots, in which attempts were made to force the bakers to sell at a rate lower than the market price, have taken place at Blois and elsewhere.

Colonial News.

New Brunswick.

Fredericton Head Quarters Jan. 20. Destructive Fire.—On Friday evening late between 11 and 12 o'clock, a fire broke out in Nelson's Steam Mills, situated at the mouth of the Nashwaakiss stream, nearly opposite this city, which entirely consumed the buildings in which the steam saw mills had been erected, together with the dwelling house on the premises, and all the adjoining buildings, except two small cottages, which were only saved by the active exertions of the fire companies, the troops, and others, who promptly repaired to the spot on the alarm being given.

The flames spread with irresistible rapidity and such was the state of the atmosphere, that hundreds who were roused by the alarm of fire, supposed, from the extraordinary brilliancy of the light which illuminated their rooms, that the fire was either on their own or the neighbouring premises, and were astonished to find on examination that it had occurred on the opposite side of the river, at a distance of about a mile from the city.

We are bound to say that the willing manner in which our citizens repaired to the spot through the deep snow, and the exertions which they used to protect what remained of Mr. Nelson's property, is highly creditable to the inhabitants of Fredericton. The military engine was also brought to the bank of the river, ready to assist in subduing the fire if required, and the troops worked with their usual alacrity. Mr. Nelson was from home when the fire occurred, and we are sorry to hear he had no insurance.

Melancholy Death.—We regret to learn that Mr. Charles Hardenbrook, residing in the parish of Westfield, about 12 miles from this city, was frozen to death yesterday morning, near the residence of Mr. James B. Lyons. It appears that Mr. H. left town on Sunday, (whether he came for the purpose of visiting a sick daughter,) on his return home, and that he became benumbed with the intense cold, and sat down by a large rock, about one hundred yards from Mr. Lyons's dwelling. Mr. H. was between forty and fifty years of age, and was much respected as an honest, upright man. His loss will be much regretted by all who knew him. We understand that he has left a wife and four children to mourn their bereavement.

MAIL CONTRACT.

TENDERS addressed to the Deputy Post Master General, Saint John, will be received until 12 o'clock at noon, on MONDAY, the 8th day of March next, from such persons as may be willing to enter into a Contract for conveying Her Majesty's Mails, twice a week each way, between ST. JOHN, N. B., and AMHERST, N. S., commencing on and from the 1st day of July, 1847; the sum per annum to be stated in Halifax currency, for which they would be willing to perform the service.

The particulars of the Contract are, that the Mails shall be conveyed on such days and at such hours as the Deputy Post Master General may from time to time appoint, in a Waggon of suitable size, (to be approved of by an officer of the Department) to be drawn by not less than two horses. The mails to be carried at a rate of speed of not less than Seven miles per hour, including stoppages. The Contract will be entered into for three years, after which period either party shall have power to annul the same, by giving a notice of Three months. The Contractor will be bound to afford perfect security to the mails, and means to protect them against the weather.

TENDERS will at the same time be received for conveying the Mails on the above conditions three times per week each way between Saint John and Amherst.
