instead of by day work. They assembled armed with their tools, cut off the communications, broke the waggons, trucks, and other machineries, and finally destroyed the tools themselves. It was only by the intervention of the troops that this emute was quelled. Bread-riots, in which attempts were made to force the bakers to sell at a rate lower than the market price, have taken place at Blois and elsewhere.

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New Brunswick.

Fredericton Head Quarters Jan. 20. Destructive Fire - On Friday evening late between 11 and i2 o'clock, a fire broke out in between 11 and 12 o'clock, a fire broke out in Nelson's Steam Mills, situated at the month of the Nashwatkaiss stream, nearly opposite this city, which entirely consumed the build-ings in which the steam saw mills had ocen crected, together with the dwelling house on the premisse, and all the 'adjoining buildings, except' two small cottages, which were only waved by the active exertions of the fire com panies, the troops, and others, who promptly repaired to the spot on the alarm being 'airepaired to the spot on the alarm being gi-YOD.

The flames spread with irresistable radidity and such was the state of the atmosphere, that hundreds who were roused by the alarm et fire, supposed, from the extraordidary bri-liancy of the light which illuminated their rooms, that the fire was either on their own or the neighbouring memises, and were esten or the neighbouring premises, and were asto-nished to find on examination that it had oc-

nighed to find on examination that it had oc-carred on the opposite side of the river, at a distance of about a mile from the city. We are bound to say that the willing man-ner in which our citizens repaired to the spot through the deep snow, and the exertions which they used to protect what remained of Mr. Nelson's property, is highly creditable to the inhabitants of Fredericton. The military engine was also brought to the bank of the ri-ver, ready to assist in subduing the fire if re-quired, and the troops worked with their usuquired, and the troops worked with their usu-al clacrity. Mr. Nelson was from home when the fire occurred, and we are sorry to hear he had no issurance.
