NEW BRUNSWICK.—The papers announce that E. W. Millar, Esq., High Sheriff of York County, died suddenly at Fredericton on Thursday morning last.

The Newbrunswick says—The Circuit Court at Kingston closed its sittings this week. Sentence was passed upon the unfortunate individual who was tried and found guilty of the Murder of his brother—the execution to take place the 29th of October next.

The three individuals charged with the murder of a coloured man, escaped on the ground that there was a flaw in the indictment.

UNITED STATES.—Late papers reports that on the receipt of the news by the Britannia, the price of all kinds of bread stuffs rapidly fell.

On the evening of Wednesday, June 9, a farmer named John Herbert, residing at the Verteg, near Pontypool, went to a limekiln on his farm, which he had charged in the morning, to see how it progressed, and finding it not burning so briskly as he wished, he went down a ladder which he placed for the purpose, with an iron bar, and gave the top vent, when he fell down apparently lifeless, from the effects it is supposed, of the carbolic acid gas which issued from the limestone. His son, a lad about 11 years of age, who was standing on the top of the kiln, called out, when a servant man who was near, ran and immediately went down the ladder to assist his master, and met a similar fate. A young man named Lewis, who was at hand, lost no time in following the servant to assist the other two, when he unfortunately fell lifeless. The son then ran off to Blaenavon to his mother, who was there attending a funeral, and gave the alarm, when several persons hurried to the kiln, and found them all three dead. An inquest was held on Friday, before Mr. W. F. Batt, deputy coroner; when a verdict of Accidental death was returned in each case.—*Monmouthshire Merlin.*
