**ANOTHER PASSENGER SHIP LOST.**—The Quebec Chronicle of the 8th inst., gives the following extract from a letter received at that place, from Capt. Thompson, of the brig Carricks, of Whitehaven, from Sligo, with passengers, which reports the loss of that vessel. It is dated at Cape Rosier, on the 19th May.

'I am sorry to inform you that the brig Carricks, was wrecked about four miles to the eastward of this place, and shocking to relate, out of 167 passengers, only 48 reached the shore—the crew, except one boy, were all saved. Little will be saved, but what there is, together with the wreck, will be sold for the benefit of all concerned on Saturday next.'

**CHURCH OF SCOTLAND DEPUTATION.**—The following gentlemen, as a Deputation from the above named Church, came out in the Cambria—Rev. J. C. Fowler, of Ratho, Presbytery of Edinburgh; Rev. Robert Stevenson, of Dalry, Ayrshire; and the Rev. Simon Mackintosh, of Aberdeen. They were landed at Halifax.

**AFFAIRS AT THE LAZARETTO.**—Doctor Vondy gives us the following news:—The number of deaths that have taken place since he has been on Middle Island is 37—17 since Tuesday last. There are at the station about 290 passengers belonging to the Looshtauk. Three of the seamen of this ship have died—the first mate is recovering—but the second mate still continues very ill. Three seamen of the Boliver have died—and one more remains very ill. All the passengers landed from the Richard White are doing well. There are about 350 persons on the Island, and as far as can be ascertained, from 25 to 30 orphans. He also states, that during the fine weather, the sick rapidly improved—but owing to the insufficiency of the buildings and canvass booths, to shelter the convalescent from the rain, many have caught cold, which has reduced them again to a very feeble state.

### YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

From papers received by this mail we glean a few items of news which we copy below.

**NOVASCOTIA.**—The papers report that Small Pox has made its appearance in Pictou, Yarmouth, Newport, and Halifax. It was brought to the last named place in the troop ship Apollo, from England. The vessel has been placed in quarantine.

The Admiral arrived at Halifax on Tuesday last.

**MEXICO.**—United States papers report, that Yellow Fever was committing sad ravages among the garrison of Vera Cruz.

Gen. Scott, it was said, expected to enter the city of Mexico on the 5th of June; but the Mexicans were said to be proceeding rapidly in fortifying Rio Frio, and an English courier at Vera Cruz states that 20,000 men were engaged in the works. Another report reduces the number to 12,000. The total number of effective men that Gen. Scott would concentrate at Puebla was stated to be 5600, independently of those recently arrived; while Gen. Alvarez is said to have 10,000 men in the vicinity of the capital.

**ST. JOHN.**—The Courier reports that about two o'clock on Wednesday morning a fire broke out in the upper part of the Phoenix Flour Mill on the south side of King's Square, owned by Messrs. Ansley and Lake, the building, with an extensive Tannery connected with it, belonging to Mr. Ansley, was consumed. The flames also spread to the Tallow Chantry of Mr. Asa Blakslee, and the house of Mr. Thomas Smith, Plumber, which were likewise consumed, and the premises of Mr. Thos. L. Taylor, Mr. C. Brown, and others were considerably injured—the flames for a considerable time being unchecked, owing to the want of a supply of water.

**PICTOU.**—The Chronicle of June 17th contains some intelligence respecting the state of affairs at the quarantine there, which we copy.

We reported last week the death of 41 of the Emigrants at Quarantine Ground; and though the mortality has been greatly diminished, and the convalescents much improved during the past eight days, we have to record up to the last evening an increase of twenty, making the total deaths 61.

The Health Officers still report a number of hopeless cases but the improvement otherwise has been so great, that we are informed that the Board of Health have given instructions to the Health Officers to use their discretion in the immediate discharge of those who they think can be released with safety.

The cases of Small Pox, 8 in number, or the lighthouse beach, are all going on well.

**UNITED STATES.**—The papers furnish intelligence that the price of flour has fallen considerably, and that crops throughout the country promise a luxuriant harvest.
