To the Reverend SIMON McINTOSH, of Aberdeen, one of the Deputation from the Church of Scotland to the British North American Colonies.

Reverend Sir,

We, the Minister, Elders and Trustees, of St. Andrew's Church, Campbellton, Restigouche, in connection with the Established Church of Scotland, have much pleasure in welcoming you, one of the Deputation from the venerable Church of Scotland.

Firmly attached to that Church in which we were brought up, and whose standards we regard as thoroughly scriptural, we are greatly delighted by the friendly interest which it thus manifested towards us, in undertaking a journey to this distant part of New Brunswick. TIMBER TRADE.—We take the following brief extract from Chaloner & Fleming's circular regarding the state of the timber trade at Liverpool. The picture drawn is any thing but flattering, and affords but little prospect of a better state of things for some time to come.—"The arrivals of Timber from British America consist this month of 19 vessels, 7549 tons. Since the 1st of February the arrivals amount to 58 vessels, 28,382 tons, which compared with those to same date last year, 100 vessels, 54,335 tons, show a falling off to the extent of 42 vessels, 55,953 tons. The stocks of yellow Pine in the yards are still very large, and the consumptive demand is limited."

NEWFOUNDLAND.—The intelligence from this Island respecting the prospects of the fishermen, is highly satisfactory. A report of the Chamber of Commerce of St. John's congratulates the inhabitants of that town on the re-erection of the Exchange, and speaks cheerily of the prospects of the town.

EARLY HARVEST.—Several very fine fields of Wheat and Oats were cut in this vicinity during the week; two of them as early as Tuesday last.

FIRE.—The valuable Saw Mills, known as the "Barnaby River Mills," owned by Messrs Gilmour, Rankin & Co. and occupied by T. Willoughby, Esq., were discovered to be on fire about midnight on Saturday last, and in a short time were totally consumed.

We are sorry to perceive by an advertisement, that it was the work of incendiaries. The liberal reward offered for the discovery of the parties, we trust will have the effect of bringing the scoundrels to justice.

COUNTY GLOUCESTER.—A fine bark of about 350 tons register, was launched from the building yard of the Hon. Joseph Cunard, in Bathurst, on Friday the 13th inst. She was named the Lord Elgin.

* * We understand that the Synod of New Brunswick in connexion with the Established Church of Scotland, will hold its next meeting in Fredericton on the second Thursday of September next.

HALIFAX.—The French Mail Steamer Missouri, from Cherbourg, out 15 days, and bound to New York, put into this harbour on the 16th instant. It appears she had been out of coal for 48 hours, when she fell in with the revenue cutter Daring, the Captain of which vessel ascertaining her necessities, went in search of a vessel having the needed article, and soon overhauled a brigantine from Sydney, who furnished her with the quantity required. She had 26 cabin and 56 steerage passengers on board. In speaking of the sailing of the Combra, for Boston, the Post says:—"she will take the news of the arrival here of the Missouri, which sailed from France four days before her, and is expected to leave for New York this evening." She is reported to be somewhat larger than the British Mail steamers.

QUARANTINE NEWS.

Saint John papers furnish the following intelligence relating to affairs at the quarantine station and emigrant hospital there.

Dr. G. J. Harding, the medical officer in charge of the Station at Partridge Island, whose duties this season have been of a most extremely arduous and trying nature, was, we regret to state, attacked with typhus fever in the beginning of last week, and is yet very ill, though we learned this morning that he was somewhat better. Doctors Wetmore and W. S. Harding have been engaged for the present to attend to the medical duties at the Station, whither they proceeded on Friday last.

The emigrants on the Island and those on board vessels at the quarantine ground, amounted on Saturday last to upwards of thirteen hundred—Two or three vessels with passengers have arrived since, at quarantine.

The number of patients in the Emigrant Hospital on the 13th inst. was 516. There were 116 admitted, 18 deaths, and 49 discharged during the week ending that day. Dr. W. Bayard, physician to the hospital, being for some time seriously ill with typhus fever, Dr. Paddock has been appointed by the Commissioners to attend to the duties for the present.

The Quebec Chronicle of the 14th instant contains the following intelligence respecting affairs at Grosse Isle.

We are sorry to state that matters were increasingly unfavourable. The detention of the healthy emigrants at the east end of the island, is said to be the cause of their falling sick and dying by scores. The deaths in that locality, within the last four days, amount to the large number of 67. In fact, all are sick. The last rites of the church were administered to 150 Catholics on the 12th. Yesterday, before 10, a.m. there were 31 deaths.

The number of sick remaining to be admitted, from vessels in the stream and the healthy tents, is over 250. Dr. Fortin went up to Montreal in the *Rowland Hill* very sick. Dr. Newton replaces him.

The number of convalescents brought up by the steamer *Neptune* yesterday, was—men, 43; women, 32; children, 53; total, 128.—Orphans, 24.

Twelve vessels still remain at the Station. No fresh arrivals since our last report.

CANADA.—Papers from this quarter speaks in high terms of the prospects of an abundant harvest.—The Provincial Advertiser for July says:—

From the most authentic information in our possession, we are warranted in stating that the crops never looked better in the whole northern range of the townships of western Canada.

QUARANTINE REPORT.—The following is Doctor Thomson's report for the past week, respecting affairs at Middle Island.

There are 66 passengers on the Island in all; 33 of whom are from the Looshtauk; 5 deaths during the week; 35 convalescent; and 16 on quarantine of observation.

YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

From papers received by this mail, we make the following selections.

ST. JOHN.—In a circular issued by M. H. Perley, Esq., it is stated that during the last fortnight 49 emigrants had died on Partridge Island. The Courier has the following article on the state of affairs at the quarantine station at that port:

"We are much gratified in being enabled to present so favorable a report as is contained in the following letter addressed to His Worship the Mayor, written at Partridge Island this morning.

"I with much pleasure inform you that my brother (Dr. G. J. Harding) has considerably improved during a day or two past, and I consider that he will be shortly restored to health.

"I have discharged a number of emigrants, being in a fit state, since coming here. The amount of sickness has considerably diminished lately, and the prospect is afforded of better order and cleanliness.

On the 16th the trial of David Nice, Henry Harding, and Richard Seely, for the murder of James White, in Carleton, came on. They were acquitted.

MEXICO.—The intelligence from Mexico since our last do not confirm the advance of Gen. Scott's army upon the capital. A letter written at Mexico on the 29th, states that Santa Anna is sole dictator—that congress can do nothing, because there is never a quorum present—that the government is seeking a closer union with European powers—and with this view has given orders for the liquidation of the claims of their subjects.
