

cision the other branch had come to yesterday he supposed the hon. Secretary's Office was considered subordinate, and therefore the hon member might have had some qualms of conscience about sitting there.

The following occurred on the 1st March.

This morning about half-past 12 o'clock, Hon. Mr. Hatch arose, and having made a remark or two upon the inconvenience arising from the frequent want of a quorum, moved an adjournment to to-morrow.

A few minutes after this adjournment Hon. Messrs. Chandler, Shore, Saunders, Kinnear, and Botsford entered the House, and upon learning what had taken place, not only expressed their surprise, but questioned the validity of the adjournment; contending that whenever the House was not in quorum, it was optional for the President himself to adjourn, but not on the motion of a member, for no motion could be regular unless a quorum were present.

LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.—We continue to publish the exciting debate which occurred on Lord Grey's Despatch. The Revenue Bill has passed, but like those that preceded it for some years past, it is a very unsatisfactory one, both for Free Trade and Protectionists—no fixed rule having been followed: we shall publish it next week. NELSON.—The Lord Bishop of Fredericton, having been pleased to institute the Rev James Hudson, B. A. M'Beau George Colebrooke; this Gentleman was inducted, according to due form of Law, on Wednesday, the 1st inst., into this Church and Rectory, with all the rights thereunto belonging. YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

We have looked over our papers, but perceive but little that is new or interesting. We give a few selections below.

ST. JOHN.—The Steamer Admiral has recommenced her trips between Boston and Saint John.

CANADA.—The following amendment has been moved to the answer to the address of the Governor General at the opening of the Legislature. Moved that the words: 'That we rejoice

that His Excellency, during his recent tour through the Province, met with the most gratifying indications of general contentment and prosperity in all the districts which he visited,' be expunged, and the following inserted in lieu thereof: 'That we rejoice that His Excellency derived so much satisfaction from the tour which during the recess he was enabled to make through the province.'

And that the words: 'That we agree with His Excellency, that Canada possesses in singular abundance,' to the end, be expunged, and the following inserted in lieu thereof: 'That with the possession in singular abundance of the elements of prosperity and social happiness,—resulting from her great natural capabilities; her enterprising, intelligent and rapidly increasing population; from Institutions which in their main characteristics are so well fitted to reconcile liberty with order; and from the blessings of peace secured to her, under Providence, by the patriotism of her sons and her connexion with a State which is both just and powerful,—Canada requires only that these advantages should be turned to account by an equitable and constitutional Government, and by wise and practical legislation to secure those blessings permanently to her people.'

'That we feel deeply the responsibility devolving upon Parliament in the endeavour to accomplish these important objects; and we cordially join with His Excellency in the prayer that we may acquit ourselves of that responsibility with fidelity and success.'

'That we feel it, however, to be our humble duty to submit to His Excellency, that it is essential to the satisfactory result of our deliberations on the important subjects to which His Excellency has been graciously pleased to direct our attention, and on other matters of public concern, that Her Majesty's Provincial Administration should possess the confidence of this House and of the Country,—and respectfully to represent to His Excellency that that confidence is not reposed in the present Advisers of His Excellency.'

The Mexican Treaty.—The Washington correspondent of the New-York Journal of Commerce states that in the Senate, on the 2d inst two votes were taken on provisions of the Treaty and those provisions were struck out, one of them is said to be the tenth article, relative to Mexican land grants. The writer adds—the Treaty is believed to be substantially rejected; and continues—A more fatal blow is to be aimed at it by Mr. Webster. It seems that it contains an article which may be so construed as to prevent Congress from prohibiting slavery in the territories to be formed out of the domain to be ceded to the United States. The alteration of that provision is a sine qua non, with the Northern Whigs, of the ratification of the Treaty.

But if the Treaty be in part or wholly rejected, it is believed that the Senate will recommend to the President to send commissioners to the Havana with power to frame with Mexican Commissioners, a treaty on the basis of this project.

Later from the Argentine Republic.—By the way of Boston, we have accounts from Buenos Ayres to the 18th Dec. The following letter from our correspondent gives all that appears of interest:—

Martevideo, Dec 18th, 1847.

There is very great excitement in the city, from apprehensions that General Oribe, with the invading army of Buenos Ayres, is about to storm the place.

The French have come forward in the most noble manner, and landed cannon, powder, and men sufficient to secure the city. The English commodore offered the French admiral, in case of an attack, the English seamen and his men, but the gallant Frenchman said to him:—'Sir France can and will defend Montevideo.'

There has been some very hard fighting with the guerillas outside the walls, and Oribe has planted some batteries nearer the city.

Buenos Ayres is to close all her ports on the 29th, against vessels running between this and that city.
