

She is 225 horse power. It is stated that she is to be placed on the river to run between Indian Town and Fredericton.

FRENCH WEST INDIES.—The New York Journal of Commerce publishes the following paragraph, relating to affairs in Martinique :

By the British mail packet Great Western, from St. Thomas, June 1st, and Bermuda 6th, we learn that an insurrection of slaves occurred at Martinique, May 22d. About a hundred of the white population, including several women and children, were massacred ; and considerable property was plundered and burnt.

Neither Governor nor a French man-of-war then lying in the harbor, interfered with the troops. The last packet stated them to be more tranquil; but all business suspended. At Gualopone they were quiet.

HALIFAX.—A disgraceful row occurred in the streets of this city in which Lieutenant Harvey, son of Sir John Harvey, and H. N. Dickson, Esq. were the principle actors.

Water Company.—The works of this enterprising company are progressing apace ; they have obtained ground for a reservoir on the common, which is to be some 330 feet square, and which one of their engineers was measuring off yesterday. This reservoir will contain an immense quantity of water, if dug any great depth, and will be quite at hand in case of fire or any other purpose, requiring a large supply of water.

The Gas Company have already succeeded in their enterprise; and we trust that this company will also succeed which will not only be the means of rewarding the shareholders but of stimulating others to form companies on a more extended scale, which would not only benefit our own city, but the whole province.

MONTREAL.—Six brick buildings in this city have been destroyed by fire.

FROM THE UNITED STATES.—The St. John Courier says—On Tuesday evening the Steamer Admiral brought us New York papers of Saturday and Boston of Monday last, and yesterday we received our files from the former place to Tuesday, and from the latter to Wednesday, by the Steamer Maid of Erin from Portland.

The Treaty of Peace between the United States and Mexico has at length been ratified by Mexico. Official information of the fact had reached Washington, and was communicated to the Senate by the President on Monday last.

The Whig National Convention at Philadelphia have nominated General Zachary Taylor for President of the United States, and Millard Fillmore, Esq., of New York, for Vice President.

St. John Observer, June 13. Quarantine Information.—The 'Delay,' from Dantry, has been placed in Quarantine, there being several cases of Small Pox on board. The 'Linden,' from Galway, is also detained, there being some fever cases among the passengers. The 'Star,' from New Ross, via Saint Andrews, where the passengers landed, is also at Quarantine, the master, mate, surgeon and three of the crew being ill with the fever.

The passengers by the 'Spring Hill,' from Donagal, who were in health were discharged from the Island yesterday.

Wreck of a Passenger Vessel from Ireland, and Loss of Life.—The bark Commerce, 267 tons, Alexander Halliday, Master, of and from Galway, with sixty eight passengers, for this port, was totally lost on Port Monton Island, a little to the westward of Liverpool, Nova Scotia, on the morning of the 31st May, and we regret to state that eight of the passengers, and an apprentice belonging to the ship were drowned. At two o'clock on the morning of the 31st, it being very dark, with a dense fog and rain, the vessel struck on a bold rocky shore, remain d stationary, and immediately filled with water. The gale increased and the sea running high, the fore and main masts were cut away to ease the ship. At daylight the long boat was got out, and made two trips to the shore with passengers, when the boat was stove and two passengers were drowned. All the remaining passengers were got on shore by means of lines, except six who were drowned in passing. They all lost every thing save what they had on; some of the passengers were left nearly naked. The ship soon broke up entirely, and the materials drifted to sea, nothing was saved but one small boat. Captain Halliday and about forty of the passengers arrived here on Tuesday last in the steamer Herald, from Liverpool, where the other survivors have remained.
