to trace the fact to its legitimate cause. We are told that business is more pros-trate in St. John, and money more scarce, than at any time since the great revulsion of 1836. To be sure there are not so many failures; but this may be ac-counted from the fact of the great scourg-ing our city received in 1842, when fail-ures were so rife; and since then, per-sons have gone along more cautiously with their business, and less upon the hap-hazard system. Nevertheless, though hankruptcies do not occur so frequently, the pressure is equally felt—business be-ing at a ' stand still,' and the Banks not discounting, and those having capital, atraid to venture it in new undertakings, very little money changes hands; and powerie with their basiness changes hands; and arraid to venture it in new undertakings, very little money changes hands; and poverty, with thousands who have alrea-dy devoured their substance, is getting to be more and more the order of the day. Under the present Colonial system things can never mend. We shall ever be sub-ject to the same fluctuations, the same pressures, and the same failures, as herepressures, and the same failures, as here-tofore. The valuable resources of our country can avail us nothing, until we learn to attend to other things beside driving a mere timber trade--until we learn to find out the best means for ob-taining the best markets. taining the best markets.
