

ITALY.

The Milan Gazette, of the same date, states that new battalions of Lombardian troops are arriving every day at the Piedmontese camp.

The Avenir d'Italia, of Milan, of the same day, announces that the Turin ministry have contracted for 50,000 Muskets with the French Government; 20,000 more are expected from England, and 40,000 from the United States.

NAPLES AND SICILY.

A telegraphic despatch, dated Naples, the 13th, has been received in Paris, announcing that the Duke of Genoa, second son of Charles Albert, has been unanimously elected King of Sicily.

MOLDAVIA AND WALLACHIA.

According to the recent accounts from the frontier of this principality to the 3rd of July, and Bucharest to the 2nd, tranquillity appeared to have reigned throughout.

The Breslau Gazette publishes a letter from the Moldavian frontiers under date July 6. It is stated that the number of Russians who have marched into Moldavia is 10,000, and that 4000 Turkish troops would enter Wallachia.

TURKEY.

We have received the journals and correspondence of Constantinople to the 1st. On the morning of that day Pera was ravaged by another fire, by which six houses were destroyed and the entire suburb menaced.

At Galatz, from the 1st of June to the 8th, 205 were attacked and 63 died. At Ibralla, from the 3rd to the 7th of June, 274 cases, of whom 70 died. This is a large proportion in reference to the population of this town.

POSTSCRIPT.

HOUSE OF COMMONS—JULY 21.

IMPORTANT NOTICE.

Lord John Russell said—I rise to give notice that I will, at the sitting of the House at twelve o'clock to-morrow, move for leave to introduce a bill to enable the Lord-Lieutenant or other chief governor or governors of Ireland, until the first day of March, 1849, to apprehend and detain any person or persons suspected of conspiring against her Majesty's person and Government.

IRELAND.

The purchase and manufacture of arms is proceeding rapidly in Ireland. Last week eighty stand of arms were purchased by the Dr. Doyle Club, of which Mr. Duffy, of the Nation, is the president.

The rebels have prepared a map of the City of Dublin subdivided into districts, in each of which, the points at which the clubs are respectively to muster, and where barricades are to be thrown up, are indicated.

CONTINENTAL.

Letters from Rendsbourg, of the 16th of July, state that war with Denmark will immediately recommence, the conditions of peace having been rejected by the duchies.

The univert publishes the Pope's answer to the Roman Deputies. It is of some importance, as showing that the Roman Commons have rather taken his Holiness 'at his word,' and interpret their freedom literally.

A letter from Coronna announces that an English vessel had landed arms on the coast of Spain. Another defeat had been sustained by the Carlists. One of the chiefs, Elio, who had crossed into France, was about to return.

Intelligence has been received from the front of war in Italy to the 15th inst. The Piedmontese army had surrounded that part of Mantua extending from Cartatone to Pretolone. Lombardian troops had arrived on the 14th. General Nunziante had, after his defeat, effected a junction with Grossi, who had taken Pizzafredda, and had nearly destroyed it. Pizzafredda had suffered a like fate, and Monteleone

was laid under heavy contribution. General Windspar had been sent from Naples to replace Nunziante.

The Milan Gazette, of the 15th, state that M. Morichini had returned from Ferrara, after a fruitless mission to Inspruck and Vienna. The Emperor of Austria declined all personal discussion, and the Minister at Vienna, only gave evasive answers.

The Breslau Gazette states that the English Government has already declared itself ready to form commercial treaties with the Vicar of the German empire, and to acknowledge the unity of Germany.

The Berlin Zeitungs-Halle, of the 18th, contradicts the report that the Poles in Posen are preparing for another insurrection.
