

derates in various parts of the country to disturb the public tranquility, and to make a general attack upon life and property, have followed up their previous measures of repression by further extensive arrests. In Lancashire no fewer than 46 persons have been included in one indictment for conspiracy, and a true bill having been found at the Liverpool Assizes, almost the whole have been taken into custody and committed for trial. Various arrests have taken place in our own town. At Ashton and in the immediate neighbourhood of Manchester, the arming of the Chartists has proceeded to a great extent, but the most energetic measures will be taken to prevent any further disturbances. In London a poor silly man named Cuffey, a chartist, who made himself very notorious about two months ago, more by his simplicity than his wicked intentions, has however now been arrested, together with a number of Confederates, and the whole will be immediately brought to trial for felony and misdemeanor. Several of the parties have turned approvers, and there is not a doubt but that Government is in possession of the most complete evidence with regard to their designs. Every thing is tranquil.

POSTSCRIPT.

France.—A report has been received in Paris that a letter has been received, by one of the legitimist leaders, from the Duke of Bordeaux in which he disavows in the strongest terms all measures which have been or may be taken in his name, having for their object the destruction of the Republic, and declaring that he never will consent to adopt any views towards the French crown unless it should be by the general and spontaneous invitation of the country.

The arrival of M. Tommaso, on a mission from the provisional government of Venice, has elicited from the government still stronger indications of its determination to limit its intervention in Italy to pacific mediation. M. Tommaso has not even been able to obtain an official audience either of general Cavour or of M. Bastide. The latter having been met by M. Tommaso in the palace of the Assembly, assured him that France could take no step in the affair which would offend Austria, but that two frigates and two steamers might probably be sent to the Adriatic to supply provisions to Venice in case of need.

The Assembly has adopted the project of a decree for the system of uniform postage; the proposed rate is 20 centimes, or 2d per quarter of an ounce for all distances, and 40 centimes, or 4d, for double the weight, and so on. It is understood that this will come into operation on the 1st of January.

The question of the property of the Orleans family was under consideration in the Council of ministers on the 24th. The Government is opposed to all confiscation, but it fears that the possession of so great a fortune might confer a dangerous power of exciting troubles and disorders in France. A suggestion has therefore, been entertained to guarantee to the members of the family, on the security of the state, a monthly salary, in lieu of their revenues.

Letters from Breslau speak of a revolution having broken out at St. Petersburg and at Warsaw. No details are given, nor do the accounts rest upon any respectable authority. The whole will no doubt, prove a hoax, fabricated by some inventive rogue to forward his own mercenary views.

Italy.—Advices of the 14th from Bologna, mention the retirement of the Austrians. Bologna is in a state of defence, with twenty thousand men under arms. The battalion Zambacari, that of the students of Rome, and that of Ferrara, have taken the three mountains, St. Michela in Bosco, Paterna, and Osservanza, and fortified them with artillery. The Austrian prisoners consist of fifty privates, a captain, a lieutenant, and two lieutenants. On the 15th, the third division of the Piedmontese army march into Turin, and was received with enthusiasm.

Wallachia and Moldavia.—A letter from Jassy says, that the harvest has been destroyed upon the fields by the peasants, as they saw clearly that they would be reaped not for them but for the Russians. The state of misery was inconceivable.

From Bucharest advices of the 24th instant, state, that ranks and titles had been abolished by the provisional government. The latter has invited the people to sign address to the Czar of Russia, in which the Sovereignty of the Ottoman Porte is admitted, with the reservation of an independent internal administration.

A letter dated Alexandria, August 1st states that the Cholera had broken out throughout all Egypt with more or less intensity. It made its first appearance about the middle of last month in a town of the Delta, called Tantah, where an immense number of people, amounting to about 165,000, were assembled in pilgrimage from all parts of Egypt and Syria to celebrate the festival of a Mahomedan saint.

Turkey.—The cholera was very mild in Constantinople by late advices. It had broken out with much severity at Adrianople. The Danubian question was under consideration of the Divan. General Duhamel has been disavowed by the Russian Government, and recalled.
