1. A social emigration must be organised as the grand preliminary, as a means to the great ead of colonisation, and a part of its ma chinery. 2nd. Existing markets must be connected and improved, and means of imme-diate employment thereby afforded to emi-grants on their first arrival, by the constructi-os of colonial-rather than colonisation railways Some assistance towards physical preparation, as in the clearing of timber land, the erection of cottages, the survey of sites for towns, the crection of bridges, and the like must also be afforded by capital and practical philanthrophy, in the outset, leaving room and Verse enough for missis enorphics - 4th Verge enough for private enterprise.-4th. Moral and sanitary pre-paration, must also be encouraged by the foundation or partial en-dowment of schools, churches, and public in-stitutions, the formation of parks and cemetes ries; and provision for all the means and se-cessaries of physical and moral health.—5th, These outlays most be recovered by the traf-fic of the lines, and the enhanced value of the lands, the price of such lands to be paid in such conventent instalatent over a period of years, es shall not press too heavily on the energies or capital of the yoeman or other colonist: and 6th. The Imperial government, upon the obvious and unexceptionable securi. upon the obvious and unexceptionable securi-ty of the colonial revenues, and the mortgage of the railways and of the lands thus enhan-ced in value, for psyment of interest and re-placement of expital, must create the necessary funds by an issue of exchequer bills or go verament money, to be advasced to the colo-nies as required, an condition of employing so many able bodied men and their families per Bille of railway. mile of railway.
