

Damariscotta, Waldoboro', East Thomaston, Belfast, Bangor. The line will be completed the present fall, and before the opening of winter. The provincial lines to Halifax are to be constructed simultaneously with that in Maine. This will bring intercourse with Liverpool, on an average, two days and half nearer Boston than at present. It is stated in the Montreal papers, that the brother of Mitchell would arrive in that city in a few days. A preliminary meeting had been called for the purpose of adopting measures to receive him.

New Brunswick, July 15.

The splendid new steamer Senator, is advertised to run for a few weeks between Boston and Bangor, after which she will be put on the route between Boston and this city.

The Mackerel Fishery.—The mackerel fishery of New England has not for many years presented so gloomy a prospect at this season, as it does the present year. For a number of years the business has not been so good as formerly, and now that our fishermen have the British Provinces to contend with in their own markets, the business looks despairing enough. The low rate of duty which the present tariff imposes, and the advantages which the people of Nova Scotia have over our fishermen to take the mackerel which flood their shores, enables them to bring to this country large quantities at a great deal less expense than our fishermen can procure them—thus supplying the market and reducing the price to a very low standard. Last year they began to import mackerel from Nova Scotia about the first of September, and about fifty thousand barrels were imported. Those that are imported now, we understand are of this year's catch. Twenty two hundred and seventy barrels have arrived at Boston this week from the Provinces, and should they continue to arrive through the season in such numbers, we do not see but that the business, so far as our fishermen are concerned, will be entirely prostrated. Under the tariff of 1842, the duty on mackerel was one dollar and fifty cents per barrel; now it is less than fifty cents per barrel.

The Message.—The President's Peace Message says that Mexico caused the war, and that the success of American arms would operate to prevent any future war with her, for years; that on our part, the war had been conducted humanely, moderately, and with magnanimity.—It calls upon Congress to make provision to meet the payments agreed upon, and appoint surveyors of the lines of boundary. The government has paid three millions down, but cannot at present estimate the value of the territory acquired. The Pacific trade, now \$40,000,000, would be increased.

The president recommends grants of land to settlers, and the disbanding of the army raised for the war, retaining a few staff officers, and that the regiments of the regular army be filled up. He recommends the extinguishment of the public debt, estimated at seventy-seven millions, quickly, by taking the Treasury surplus invested in the purchase of public stock, and repudiates the government policy in regard to the debt incurred in the last war.

Fredericton Reporter, Friday July 14.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, we understand, within a few days, had a regular Bush excursion to the northward. On the 24th he left Fredericton, accompanied by Lieut. Col. Hayne, A. D. C., and his Private Secretary, Mr. Peenefather, and proceeded to the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Company's principal settlement at Stanley. On the 26th, His Excellency passed through the woods in a direct line, to the head of the Miramichi Lake, a distance of about 23 miles. On the following morning, the party crossed the Lake in canoes which had been placed in readiness for the occasion, and descending by the "Little Brook," entered the Southwest Branch of the Miramichi River, forty five miles above Campbell and Boiesetown, which latter place the party reached on the 29th, and returned to Fredericton on the following day. In addition to the experience of travelling through woods as yet unencumbered with roads, which his Excellency has gained, he has also, we learn, seen the route marked out by the recent survey, for the Halifax and Quebec Railway, and several other important stations in the northeast part of the Country, including the intended site for Bridging the Southwest Miramichi.

His Excellency camped out four nights, and is the first of our Governors—at least

for many years, who has had such practical knowledge of the wilderness in its original grandeur, and with its great natural capabilities for the purposes of future civilization. He is also said to be an expert deciple of old Isaac Walton, but although he made the trial, the salmon shewed no disposition to be caught even by the Representative of Majesty.

New Brunswick is justly proud of being an appendage of the British Empire, but her people often feel annoyed at their valuable and extensive Territory being set down in England as a mere stepping stone to the Province of Canada; and we believe that much of the ignorance which exists on this subject, may be traced to the sedentary habits of many of her former Rulers, who if they only could find things comfortable in the vicinity of Government House, gave themselves little trouble to acquire more general—at least practical—knowledge. The extreme ignorance which exists on the other side of the water, in relation to the extent of New Brunswick, cannot be better portrayed than in the story at present going the rounds of the English Papers, namely, that the Mail-carriers first take the letter portion of the Mails from Halifax to Quebec, and then return of course stepping across New Brunswick—for the newspapers!
