

relief of sick and destitute Emigrants from the Mother Country, you have displayed a liberality honourable to the Colony, and that cannot fail to be appreciated at Home. I trust that your resources may not, during the current year, be taxed so heavily by casualties of that description, and that a people who, while sympathizing with others, have borne their own trials with steadiness and patience, may be blessed by Providence, in the coming season, with an abundant harvest.

In the Act for constructing an Electric Telegraph from the Capital to the Northern Frontier of Nova Scotia, inviting the adjoining Colonies to an instantaneous intercommunication of intelligence and interchange of thought—in that which invests me with powers to co-operate with the Imperial and Colonial Governments for the establishment of a cheap and uniform rate of postage—and in your action in relation to the great Colonial enterprise, of connecting the Atlantic and Quebec by Railroad—her Majesty's Government will not fail to perceive, and your fellow subjects to recognize, a desire to elevate the latter in the scale of civilization, and to unite and strengthen this most important portion of her Majesty's Dominions.

The Act to provide for the collection of the Revenues has been rendered indispensable by the repeal of the Imperial Duties. The powers it confers upon the Lieutenant Governor, to be called into exercise when the Lords of the Treasury shall have completed the contemplated arrangements, are gratifying proofs of the confidence you repose in my government, and I shall take care that the policy upon which that measure is based, is steadily kept in view.

CANADA.—Late papers put us in possession of the following important items of news:

The following facts in relation to the lumber trade, are of some interest:—Canadian lumbermen are beginning to find out that New York is a much better market for their great staple, white pine, than Britain. The price in that city has, for the past year, been, we are informed, about 1s. of our money per foot, and the expense of taking it there than to Quebec only about 4d. additional; so that the article which is lying unsaleable in Quebec at 4d. might, if directed into the right channel, have yielded 8s. A considerable supply would, however, of course, somewhat depress the market; but it is stated upon good authority, that it is not at all likely to fall below 9d. of our money in New York, which is equal to 5d. at Sorel, and indeed is said, that at this latter price there are contracts made for delivery at that port. Timber passes from thence up the Richelieu river, through Lake Champlain and the Northern canal and down the Hudson.

Great excitement has been produced in Canada by the discovery of some gold mines, which have been discovered near Quebec, on the lordship of Mr. Delery. As some persons who are interested in mining speculations appear astonished that the discovery of a gold mine so near Quebec should not have been made long before this, it may be necessary to inform them that this mineral has been frequently found by the peasantry of the neighbourhood, and that the district through which the streams flow, has for years been known by the inhabitants under the name of *Le Val d'Or*. It was from similar discoveries of copper and silver, on the shores of the upper lakes by the Indians, &c. that the capitalists were induced to commence explorations; but not content with such evidences of the existence of this precious metal, Mr. Delery has corroborated these discoveries by the scientific researches of Mr. Cunningham, who has spent several years in similar pursuits. In the second report published by this gentleman, there is given the exact amount of gold obtained from several washings, and although these experiments were conducted in a hasty manner, and with imperfect implements, they have incontestably established the value of the mine and the cheapness and facility in working it—some of the gold has been sent to New York, and it has been pronounced of the richest and purest quality.
