On Wednesday evening strong bodies of police, well armed for an encounter, made a sudden attack upon the Chartist Club, in Webber street, Blackfriars, and captured fourteen men. Upon their being searched they were found to be armed with pistols loaded to the muzzle, pikes, three cornered daggers, spear heads, and three cornered daggers, spear heads, and swords, with an ample supply of gunpowder, shot, and tow balls. Upon one man 75 rounds of ball carridge were discovered. A gang of Chartists in Yorkstreet, Westminister, were waiting to march out to join their comrades, and were captured, and in one or two other parts of the metropolis similar arrests were made. It is reported that the Government have complete information respecing the designs of the parties, and have taken the most effectual measures to suppress any further attempts which may be made to disturb the public peace.

#### FOREIGN NEWS.

RUSSIA.

An imperial ukase, under date of the 31st of July, orders the recruiting of seven men per 1000 inhabitants in the governments of the eastern moiety of the empire.

The first detachments of the Russian army

are to be seen about two German miles from the Prussian frontier. The Cossacks and light Cavalry form the vanguard, next comes light Cavalry form the vanguard, next comes the infantry, then the artillery, and the heavy cavalry in the rear. A camp of 40,000 men is established near Warsaw; and another, under the command of General Rodziwill, is in the direction of Gallicia. The army in Poland consists of two corps, amounting to about 50,000 men; a part only of a third corps has entered the kingdom, the rest remaining in the camp near Luck, on account of the presence of the cholera in the ranks.

The Emperor was expected at Warsaw, but his journey has been postponed, probably in consequence of the ravages of the cholera is St. Petersburgh.

The St. Petersburgh Journal of the 1st inst.

The St. Petersourgh Journal of the 1st inst. publishes a long expose by the Emperor of his mouves for intervention in the principalities of Wallachia and Moldavia. It states, in the most positive terms, that the intervention is with the consent and concurrence of the Ottoman Porte, and that the Russian troops will act only in accord, if action should become necessary, with those of the sultan.

HANBURGH.

It is reported that the Emperor of Russia will not recognise either the Administrator or his Parliament, and demands from Prussia an immediate cessation of hostilities with Denmark, declaring again that he shall look upon it as a declaration of war should the confederate army enter Jutland.

ITALY.

An outbreak of a very serious nature has oc-curred at Bologns, within the Papal domin-ions. It appears that a troop of Hulan ca-valry and a company of Austrian is faulty, had attived there and took a position in order of battle in front of the palace of the Govern-ment. The captain of the Postificial carbi-acers demanded, in the name of the Pro-Le-gate, the cause of this violation of the convention made with General Welden. The Austrian officer answered that he obeyed an order received before the convention, and then evacetived before the city; but posts were established by the Austrians at the three gates of Galliare, Strado. Maggiore, and San Felice, On the afternoon of the 8th, the Austrian General Walden, having levied a heavy contribution upon Bologna, and demanded hostages for the Payment, and for the subjection of the Bolognese, the people rose and the tocsin wassounded. A conflict ensued which is said to have been terrible. Inder date of the 9th, at six in the morning, we find! the, following:—'The Bolognese have driven the Austrians out of the city, after making 27 prisoners. Bologna is in the hands of the people, and ready to receive another attack from the enemy, who must have got reinforcements. The people with their knives drove the Austrians to a distance of two miles from the city. The Cutate of San Felix is at the nead of the people of the Gontado. Under the date of half-past six we read:—'The bombardment has commenced, and two palaces are in flames. The lauboutg has already been pillaged and over received before the convention, and then evamenced, and two palaces are in flames. aubourg has already been pillaged and ourned, but the population have resolved to resist to the last drop of their blood.

It is further stated, that in the afternoon of At 18 further stated, that in the attenuous the Sth. an officer bearing a despatch for the Pro Legate, was killed by some Bolognese, as he was passing through San Felice. Half an hour afterwards a soldier of the line, carrying appragnessing through San Felice. Half and appragnessing through San Felice. The line, carrying another despatch, met with the same late. The Austrians on guard at the gates of San Felice. Felice, where a cannon was planted, fired it velice, where a cannon was planted, fired it upon the people, but fortunately no one was silled. Upon this the Austrians went out of the town to Montagnola. They amounted to 2500 men, and had with them a cannon and a howitzer. In this favourable position they in several places. It was about five in the afternoon when the firing began, and it did not cease till eight at night. On the side of the Bolognese there were fifty carbineers, thirty custom house officers, upwards of 500 ports. thirty custom house officers, upwards of 500 porters, and some national guards. All displayed the most extraordinary courage, and in the end took Montegnola by assauk, and drove

away the Austrians, who, on leaving the Galliera gate, lost an officer and forty men killed and fifty prisoners. The carbineers and custom house men pursued them for more than a mile. The loss of the Bolognese was confined to fitteen killed and wounded. In the evening there was an Alumination. One of the porters took an Austrian flag, at six on the morning of the 9 h. the Austrians returned but their communications were cut off. The national guard, on taking up arms, determined to fight to the last drop of their blood. There is no want of ammunition.
