as his grace, at his time of life will scarcely allow himself to be made the tool of a few active designing prelates, we have no doubt that the prescribed ceremony will duly take place, and thus prevent any further disruption in the Church. A report is circulated that Bijshop Wilberforce has withdrawn his opposition to Dr. Hampden, which if true, will go far to break up this mischievous confederacy of disappointed bishops.

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#### FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

FRANCE—It is said that a serious difference of opinion exists between the King and M. Guizot on the subject of the affairs of Switzerland. The King is against any interference, while M. Guizot is anxious to join Austria in Making a demand on the Vorort to reinstate the Governments of the Cantons of the Sonderbund as they stood previous to the commencement of the war. Russia, it is said, has refused to send a note to the Vorort, but would acquiesce in the decision of the other powers. Prussia would join Austria and France in a conference, and the Germanic Diet has expressed its approval of the notes of Austria and France, and has determined that, if the form of the Federal Government in Switzerland is changed, the powers guaranted by the treaty of Vienna would be entitled to deprive the confederation, of its neutrality. King Leopold is covertly acting with the Jesuits party, as he considers that he owes his crown to their machinations.

Count Colloredo and General Radowitz, Eavoys Extraordinary of Austria and Prussia to the conference on Swiss affairs which was

Count Colloredo and General Radowitz, Eavoys Extraordinary of Austria and Prussia to the conference on Swiss affairs, which was originally to be held at Neufchatel, arrived at Paris on the 24th alt; they immediately waited on M. Guizot, who, although suffering from the grippe, felt obliged to receive them. No doubt the subject of their deliberation was the situation of Switzerland, which Austria regards with undiminished horror; but it is said that the French Government will not interfere. It is reported in the best informed terfere. It is reported in the best informed circles that a confederation of Lombardy, Modena, and Parma is about to take place in sup-port of Austrian interests.

Austria.—The Austrian Cabinet appears determined to interfere by force in the internal affairs of Switzerland. The official article published in the Austrian Observer of the 17th ult, amounts nearly to a dec aration of war, and has produced an immense cersation, not only amongst the high aristocracy of Austria, but also amongst the friends and partisans of Prince Metternich, who were little accustomed to so violent a language on the part of the Chancellor of State. Persons acquainted with the Court of Austrian, however, can easily account for it. The Emperor Ferdinand, notwithstanding the extreme weakness of his mind and character, is a zealous Catholic. The Empress, who governs him, and is a stre-nuous supporter of Prince Metternich, has constantly taken the most lively interest in the fate of the seven cantons of Catholic Switzer-

It is said on undoubted authority, that Count Colleredo and General Radowitz, who have just left for Berlin and Paris, have been intructed to urge those two Cabinets to join in a formal declaration of war against the federal majority of Switzerland.

SWITZERLAND—The enly impediment to the general pacification of the country has been the difficulty of arranging the payment of the fine of 360,000 francs imposed upon Neufschatel. The Cantonal Government and the Assembly unanimously agreed on accepting and submitting to the decree of the Diet, and and submitting to the decree of the Diet, and paying the fine inflicted upon it for its misdoings in relation to the late war, and so getting rid of the affair. But while this was going on, the Sovereign Prince of Neufchatel, (the King of Prussia,) after securing the concurrence of the French Cabinet, came to a resolution to sustain the refusel which he assumed that the canton would return to the decree of the Diet. The tender of the amount has been made in bills to the Diet, which not being satisfactory, the case is still open.

The expenses of the war in Switzerland are at present estimated at \$,000,0000f.

On the 16th ult. the Voorst gave a grand dinner in honour of Sir Stratford Canning. The Ministers of Spain and Belgium were at

The Ministers of Spain and Belgium were at the dinner, but the French ambassador and the first Secretary of the Embassy being absent, no invitation could be sent. The deputies of the Diet, the commander-in-chief of the Federal army with his staff, and the first magistrates of the canton were present.

ITALY.-The Ministers of the Archduchess Maria Luisa, Duchess of Parma and Piacenza, issued a proclamation on the evening of the 17th ult., ausouncing to the people the demise mise of that princess, the widow of Napoleon at 5 o'clock p. m. on that day. They stated that an express had been immediately sent to the Duke of Lucca to apprise him of the event and that they would continue to direct the Government until the arrival of the new second Government until the arrival of the new so-vereign. The Isudden ideath of the Arch-duchess Maria Lusia, may produce a new complication in the affairs of Tuscany.

The Austrian troops still continue to advance towards the Talian feeding Field Marian

towards the Italian frontier. Field-Marshal General Radetzky; commander-in-chief of the Austrian forces in Lombardy, has been invested with additional powers, and the army un-der his orders is to be increased immediately to 60,000 men. Six battalions of infantry stationed along the frontier have been ordered to ready to march at a moment's notice.

volt. At Gherean and at Gebel they rose en y masse against the Turks, and killed the governor of Gebel, Ahmed Effendi, and above a hundred of his people. They rose against

him on account of the tyranny exercised by him. During the period of thirteen years that he has been governor he has done nothing but plunder the people, take away their eniddren and massacredithe men. Those families who, in the name of Geramanii, the former governor, paid twenty dollars, annual tribute to the Turks, are now compelled to pay one undred dollars. This is the reason way the people of Bengazy, to the aumber of thirty thousand, fled to Egypt and Smyras. More than forty thousand have fled from Tripoli unto the regency of Tunis. Those actually in Tripoli, are living in a state of misery. The war schooner Sajah "Catters has sailed for Malta with despatches for the Sultan, in which Malta with despatches for the Sultan, in which the governor requested the Sultan to send immediately five or six thousand troops to exterminate the rebels.

Advices from Constantinople state that a coalition has taken place between Ruschid Paccha and the party of which Riza Pacha is the head; and the latter has been nominated commander in chief, and has promised his co-operation in various important measures of reform and progress proposed by Reschid. Said Paccha has been dismissed. The Turkish fleet had arrived at the Golden Horn, and a report was circulated that Gapudan Pacha was to be dismissed.

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.—We have Cape of Good Hope papers to the end of October The latest and most important news from the froatier is, that Sandilla and a number of his followers have surrendered to the British forces on the simple condition that their lives shall be spared, and that as far as he and his tribe are concerned, the war may be considered to have terminated. Driven into the recesses of the Amatola mountains, it appears this chief found himself and his warriors to tally discomfited, and running short of Provisions; and on receiving supplies from his oppositions. tally discomined, and running short of Provisions; and on receiving supplies from his oppornents, he determined to lay down his arms
and capitulate at discretion. Pato the other
