

George Kerr, Esquire, the Treasurer gave a very lucid account of the financial affairs of the Society, which, we were gratified to hear, are in a more flourishing condition than at any previous period of the Society's existence. The proceedings of the meeting, as well as the Report above alluded to, will be published on Tuesday next.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

The Steamship Cambria arrived at Halifax on the morning of Sunday week, in a passage of fourteen and a half days. She left Liverpool on the 1st of the month, and we obtained papers to that date.

Parliament adjourned on the 20th ult to the 3rd February. A few days previous, the Government had consented to the appointment of a committee to inquire into the state of the West India colonies, and a motion to that effect was to be introduced by Lord George Bentinck on the first day of the re-assembling of Parliament.

We are glad to perceive that some improvement has taken place in commercial affairs. The papers speak confidently that the crisis had passed, and that business in the manufacturing districts, and that commerce of the country would speedily resume their wonted buoyancy and spirit.

The Irish Coercion Bill had passed both houses of Parliament, and received the Royal assent on the 25th ult.

The Privy Council immediately after adopted a proclamation declaring the act to be in force from and after the 29th Dec. in the following districts:

The county of Limerick and Tipperary; the baronies of Bunratty, Tully, and Clonderlaw, in the county of Clare; the baronies of Glengary, and Upperthird, in the county of Waterford; the baronies of Athlone, Roscommon, Ballymore, Boyle, and the parishes of Grieve, Koorsey, Kilnemeagh and Killoola, in the barony of Frenchpark, Roscommon; the baronies of Leitrim, Mohil, and Carrigallen; the baronies of Conmohon, and Upper Longtree, and the baronies of Longford, Granard, and Ardagh, county Longford. The principal effect of this measure is to prevent persons carrying fire-arms without license, after the 29th December. As to have arms indiscriminately, even in dwellings, is considered dangerous to the public peace, the powers of the act for calling in arms will be made use of, and then no person will be allowed to have arms, even in their dwelling houses without license.

We give in another place lengthy extracts, which will put our readers in possession of all the news.

TIMBER TRADE.—Extracts from the Liverpool Circular, published on the 31st December.

Fine Timber.—Cargoes as they have come forward during the month have been principally disposed of on the quay, with the exception of a few which have lately arrived. The rates obtained have been similar to those current last month, viz.:—14d to 14½d per foot for Quebec Yellow Pine, 15½ to 16½d per foot for St. John's spruce according to average sizes and quality, and 12d to 14½d for Miramichi. The quantity of Yellow Pine at present in port, is estimated at 3,167,000 feet which under ordinary circumstances would be considered light stock.

Pine and Spruce Planks.—In the early part of the month, 4 yarded cargoes of St. John's and St. Stephen's spruce were sold at 24 per foot of 2 inches, the purchaser paying the yarding expenses. On the quay, a quantity of St. John's Spruce brought £3 per Standard, and a cargo of Cumberland, N. S., £7 15s. per Standard; cargo of Miramichi Pine, of good quality, has been sold at £9 per standard, any inferior Lower Port cargoes have been sold by auction at 11. 16ths to 24 per foot.

ARRIVALS IN BRITAIN.

Limerick, December 18.—The Energy, Warren, of this port, from Miramichi, was driven ashore under Kilcain battery, during the gale 16th inst., but has been got off and brought in with slight damage to bottom.

YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

The papers by this mail came to hand this morning, as it was late in the night when the Courier arrived. After a hasty glance at their contents, we do not perceive any thing of importance. We give a few extracts below.

The Canada Mail by the Steamer Britannia, was carried from Halifax, by express, to Quebec, and reached there as early as it could have been carried to Montreal by the Boston line. It reached Montreal sooner than letters mailed on the day after the steamer arrived at Boston.—New York Journal of Commerce.

The Mail by the Caledonia was received at Quebec on the morning of the 9th inst.—five days after arrival of the steamer at Halifax.—Halifax Courier.

Mexico.—By arrival at Vera Cruz from the city of Mexico, the important intelligence has been received of the issuing of orders by General Scott, to the effect that the American army is about to spread itself over and hold possession of the entire republic of Mexico, until the government of the latter sues for peace upon terms that will be acceptable to the United States.

The Monitor publishes a letter from Queretaro, in which it is stated that, in consequence of the departure of several Deputies, the pre-Mexican Congress would not again come together. The new Deputies and Senators, the letter adds, will soon be in the city.—New York Herald.

Captain the Hon. William Fitzwilliam Owen a member of the Legislative Council of this Province, and who proceeded to England lately in the surveying-steamers Columbia, was promoted on the 21st ult. to be a Rear-Admiral of the Blue.

Trial for Murder.—The trial of Dennis M'Govern for the murder of James Briggs, jr. in Portland, on the night of the 6th September last, commenced on Wednesday, and occupied the attention of the Court until three o'clock on the following day, when the case went to the jury.

The Jury after an absence of about three hours, came into Court with a verdict of Not Guilty, when the prisoner was discharged.

The trial of Flynn and Regan, for assaulting Wm. Dunbar and David Rolston, with intent to kill, took place yesterday. The former was acquitted, and the latter found guilty.—St. John Courier.

For Liverpool.—The Royal Mail Steamship Caledonia, Captain E. G. Lott, left for Halifax and Liverpool this afternoon, with the monthly mail and thirty passengers. She takes out \$132,000 67 in specie, \$50,000 of which was shipped by Messrs. Gilbert & Son, on New York account. The British despatches for London have been received and forwarded. The American despatches will remain behind with the New York passengers, letters and specie, that should have come by last evening's boat. And now having dispatched our outward bound steamer, we will look after the inward bound steamer, Washington, that the New Yorkers are expecting, and send them some account of her. She has done pretty well considering.

LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.—Mr. Partelow asked leave to bring in a bill to re-establish Boards of Health in the Province. A good move. Mr. Montgomery took his seat for Restigouche. The 12th of February is fixed as the latest period for receiving petitions. Mr. Boyd has introduced a bill to repeal the law, authorising the Retail of Ardent Spirits.
