

French colony of Senegal, and his admission to the Assembly will be a fresh source of difficulty to the Government. In the Assembly, on Tuesday, a violent recrimination having taken place between M. Clement Thomas and M. Pierre Bonaparte, originating with some remarks made by the former respecting the conduct of Louis Napoleon, who had denied, in the newspapers, any connection with the *emutes* in Paris; M. Pierre Bonaparte challenged Clement Thomas at the foot of the tribune. A scene of confusion ensued, in which Clement Thomas declared that Louis Bonaparte was not a candidate for the Presidency, but for the imperial dignity. The sitting was temporarily suspended, and in the *Salle des Pas Perdus* Pierre Bonaparte again challenged M. Clement Thomas. We have not yet heard how the affair terminated. The banquets of the Red Republicans still keep the whole country in a state of excitement; that of Sunday last passed off quietly, but M. Flocon and M. Leroux are to follow up M. Ledru-Rollin in this career of agitation, and the undiminished efforts to promote Raspail's return for the Presidency, plainly indicate that the Red Republicans meditate an unrelenting opposition to anything in the shape of a moderate government. The opinions we have expressed that the chances are all in favour of Louis Bonaparte's triumphant election continue unchanged. Lamartine has been speechifying to his constituents at Macon, but his want of purpose and self vanity quite preclude him from any hopes of arriving at supreme power. The French Three per Cents. closed on Thursday at 44 65; the Five per Cents. at 68 85.

Commercial affairs have improved during the week, and there is now a greater amount of confidence than has been manifested for some time past. Cotton continues in a steady demand, and although the sales are not to a large extent prices are fully supported. The market for Breadstuffs has rather receded in prices owing to large arrivals.

An increased quantity of Money is on offer, and at a moderate rate of interest.

SPAIN.—It is said that Cabrera has shot 20 officers in reprisals for the 19 whom General Villalonga lately put to death. The corps which entered Benaguacil has also shot 5 soldiers, because General Villalonga had caused 5 Carlists to be shot at Liria.

PRUSSIA.—On the 16th inst. serious disturbances occurred at Berlin, in consequence of a conflict which had arisen between the burgher guard and labourers, in a part of the city called the Copnickersfeld. Great excitement had prevailed among the labourers in that quarter already, since several days, on account of a machine having been employed for some work there, and a number of labourers having been dismissed who were previously engaged at work. On the morning of the 16th crowds of laborers proceeded with red flags to the Copnickersfeld, to destroy the machine and demand employment. Two battalions of the burgher guard, which had been ordered out, could not restore order, but were compelled to use fire-arms on their being attacked by the labourers. Towards the afternoon the whole city was thrown into alarm, and the affray had become a regular fight between the labourers and the burgher guards. The latter were using their arms freely; and when they had finally succeeded in suppressing the row five laborers had been killed, and many wounded. In the evening towards 8 o'clock, the fighting between the burgher guards and the workmen recommenced. Barricades had been constructed in the streets near the Copnickersfeld, and attempts were made by the burgher guard to take them by storm. At half past 8 o'clock the burgher guard had succeeded in taking the principal barricades in Dresden and Ross streets, but not without hard fighting and loss of life on both sides. Two captains of the burgher guard were mortally wounded at the barricades in Ross street. Patrols of the burgher guard traversed the streets till late at night, and the excitement in every part of the city was intense, but tranquillity was gradually restored. No further tumults have since occurred, though it was apprehended that fresh riots would have arisen at the public funerals of the persons who lost their lives.

The cholera is making rapid and fatal progress in Konigsberg. On that account, and in order not to keep the inhabitants exposed to the cold air, the civic authorities dispensed with the contemplated illumination in honour of the King's birthday.

According to letters from the Kingdom of Poland, 200,000 Russian troops are

posted on the Posen and Gallician frontiers.

The mortality in Berlin is very great, even when cholera cases are not taken into account. One journal accounts for this circumstance, on the ground that care, anxiety, and apprehension of coming events are making many victims. The day laborers on the canal continue to display much dissatisfaction. It is ascertained that no small number of them belonged, in less adverse times, to the better class of tradesmen.

POSTSCRIPT.

The Assembly decided that the discussion of the of the question should not be adjourned, and then that the debates on the articles should not take place at once: The first article of the project (fixing the nomination of the President for the 10th December) was then put to the vote. The following is the result of the scrutiny:—

The Assembly then adjourned.

AUSTRIA.—We learn, from intelligence by way of Berlin, that as soon as it became known at Vienna, that the Hungarians had retired to their previous position, the populace rose and accused the Assembly of treachery. All power over the multitude was lost. The Assembly threw itself on the protection of the foreign embassies, whilst the people abandoned themselves to pillage, and to the commission of every possible excess. Windischgraz, appointed generalissimo of all the Austrian forces, was moving forward with the utmost speed, whilst Jellachich and Auersberg, relieved from all apprehensions of an attack from the rear, are drawing closer upon the city, more with a view of aiding in putting an end to the frightful state of anarchy than with that of attack. This intelligence was believed in Berlin.

ITALY.—The mediation of the central power at Frankfurt will, it is almost certain, be substituted for that of England and France, in the affairs of Italy. The government of Frankfurt has just made overtures in this sense to the Sardinian Government, through their ambassador at Turin, Mr. Heckscher. That personage has been ordered to notify to the Sardinian Government that if Charles Albert abandoned mediation and resumed hostilities, the central power felt itself bound towards Austria on one hand to support it against the Hungarians, in order to allow Radetzky to preserve the whole of his force in Italy; and on the other to cause the advance into the Tyrol of a large force of Bavarians to support the Austrians in Italy. M. Heckscher is said to have added that their determination would be carried into effect with the more regret, as the central power agreed with Sardinia in its general views, and was favorable to the re-establishment of nationalities. Should Sardinia accept the mediation, the project would be for Lombardy to assume a position similar to that of Schleswig or Luxemburg, united to Germany by a federal tie. The answer to this proposal is not yet known.
