THE CANADA.—Willmer & Smith's
European Times furnishes the following
notice of this new Steamer, of the Cunard
line.

The last of the newly built ships belonging
to the British and North American Royal
Mail Steamship Company has reached the Mer-
sey. The Canada, under the command of
Captain Judkins, arrived here on Tuesday,
and judging from the time she took in running
from Glasgow to this port, she induces the be-
lief that if anything she will excel her sister
ships for speed. Like all the other ships be-
longing to the company, particularly those
lately built, the Canada is a beautiful model,
and well put together. Her materials, both
wood and iron, are of the best description, and
the arrangements for passengers of the most
ample and satisfactory kind. But we need
not farther allude to her beauty and appearance,
inasmuch as she sets out for New York on the
25th inst., and both there and at Halifax our
friends will have an opportunity not only of
judging her as a model, but also of duly esti-
mating her great power and speed. It only re-
mains for us to congratulate Captain Judkins
on his new charge, and to express our hope
that he may be as successful in his command
of the Canada, as he has hitherto been in the
other ships belonging to the company.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT POKEMOUCHE.—
We are sorry to have it to record, that
the new Chapel in course of erection at
Pokemouche, in the County of Gloucester,
was discovered to be on fire on the
morning of Wednesday, the 15th inst.,
which was soon communicated to the ves-
try adjoining, and the old chapel, situate
a short distance from it. The three build-
ings, in a very short space of time, were
reduced to a heap of ashes. The new
building was 120 feet long, 44 feet wide
and 26 feet posts, with a fine tower. The
outside was completed, and all the win-
dow-sashes were in the building, ready
to be placed, together with much of the
inside finishing. The loss, a Correspondent
informs us, cannot be less than
£1,000.

Mr. Dwyre, the master builder and ar-
chitect, has suffered severely. He lost
all his tools, wearing apparel, £10
in cash, and a quantity of produce, which
had been collected in payment of his
work. The two men in his employ
(James Mann and Martin Deverick)
have also lost their tools, and other things
of value, as nothing was saved from the
building.
It is impossible to say how the acci-
dent originated, as Mr. Dwyre had care-
fully put out the fire which was in the
stove, the evening previous, and thrown
a quantity of water on the shavings, in
presence of Mr. Landry, one of the Eld-
ers, and several other individuals, who
remained in the vestry after he had left
the premises. The building was got up
by public subscription, principally among
the inhabitants of the settlement, and the
loss will be severely felt by them, more
particularly in these depressed times.

THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.—The fol-
lowing article copied from the New
Brunswick, will furnish our readers
with an idea of the wretched plight in
which the Corporate property is at pre-
sent. There must have been great ne-
glect of duty on the part of the city offi-
cers, or something worse, to place the af-
fairs of the city in such an awkward di-
lemma.

The Courier of Saturday contains a notice
from the Sheriff's office, in the usual form,
that the whole of the real estate of the Mayor,
Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of Saint
John, will be sold by the Sheriff in May next,
to satisfy an execution issued out of the Su-
preme Court.

All the city lots and waterside property on
both sides the harbour, with Navy Island,
Partridge Island, the Islands in the Falls, the
lands in Lancaster, the flats in Courtenay bay,
the Court House, the Gaol, the Orphan Asy-
lum, the Market House, the Mayor's Office,
the Engine Houses, the Breakwater, the Ferry-
landings, the Hay Scales, the Shippage—ev-
erything in fact which belongs to the City, in
its corporate capacity, has been seized; and
the Citizens of St John have the mortification
and disgrace of seeing their extensive and va-
luable real estate, with their public buildings
and property of every description, offered for
sale by the Sheriff.

Owing to the bad faith, bad management,
loose system of accounts, corruption, reckless-
ness, and extravagance of former Boards of
Common Council, the whole of the property
now advertised by the Sheriff, has been mor-
gaged to Trustees, to secure certain city cre-
ditors for £116,000 or thereabouts. The
Sheriff will now sell the equity of redemption
only, and that being gone, farewell to the city
property forever. We predicted this termina-
tion to city affairs nearly seven years ago, and
were then heartily abused; the outrageous
conduct of the common council and its officers
could lead to no other result, and here we
have the consummation, publicly and official-
ly before us.

Notwithstanding all that has occurred, sev-
eral of the men who were steeped to the lips in
the extravagance and misconduct of former
days, have been year after year returned to
the common council, where they still sit to
look stupidly and helplessly upon the ruin and
disgrace they have brought upon their fellow
citizens. Those who have so long continued
to uphold these men in office, have obtained
their just reward.

But as to the last and final blow it may be
asked—who is it that hath done this? It hap-
pens that the plaintiff in the suit against the
city, and upon whose execution the city prop-
erty is to be sold, is John R. Partlow, as ex-
ecutor of the late Agnes Campbell!!! It need
only thisto render the climax complete.—
