PLOUGHING MATCH AND CAT-TLE SHOW

OF THE NORTHUMBERLAND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The annual Ploughing Match and Carrie Show of the Northumberland Agficultural Society, came off at Newcastle

on Tuesday, the 3rd day of this month. The weather could scircely have been more pleasant or better suited to the occasion: and it being the day of the FAIR, which is held annually at the county town, the number of speciatators was considerably greater than it otherwise

By 10 o'clock Sisteen Ploughs had teached the field of competition. therefore became evident that the field selected for the occasion, was not only too small, but that it—together with a amall lay field adjoining-would both Prove inadequate. In this dilemma, the committee, whose duty it was to select DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES OF THE CATTLE and lay off the ground, resolved, as the show. alternative, to devide, or cut the anall field, by running a ridge across the centre of it: — In this way the sixteen ploughmen were accommodated. It must be admen were accommodated. be admitted, however that there was a good deal of grumbling occasioned by andry causes, which the Society will no doubt. doubt carefully guard against in future. One of these causes was the ground being exceedingly stoney and rough, parlicularly the small field, where it was the lor of several first rate ploughmen to stationed. Nothing can be more teasing to any tastey ploughman than small ound stones, firmly imbedded in the subsoil: so grievousiy was this annoyange felt, that every ploughman on the

At 25 minutes to 11 o'clock-the ploughmen having previously drawn tickets for their respective ridges-the sixteen ploughs were in motion, each gliding cautiously along in its turrowed course. This strange circumstance is attributable to two causes, first, the absence of certain animals to claim prizes, and secondly, the 'unworhiness' of certain animals to the prizes offered.
