

House of Lords. Similar writs are allowed by the Crown in the cases of Messrs Meagher, O'Donohue, and M'Manus Hungary.—The Pesth Gazette of the 15th instant, writes, Transylvania is in open war against us, that is to say the Saxon part of the population. As a certain Simonich, calling himself General, has made an irroad into Hungary, at the head of a body of Galician peasants, a reward has been offered for his apprehension. The corps of Croats, which had been ineffectually attacked on the 9th, by the National Guard of Oedenburg, has been beaten by General Moga. One 3rd of the enemy was cut to pieces, a second taken prisoners, and the remainder dispersed.

Prussia.—A letter from Berlin of the 26th ult. says: 'The city is exceedingly agitated.' Placards are posted, urging the people to prepare for a siege and to supply themselves with a stock of provisions.

France.—The National announces that a revolution has broken out at Bruun, in Moravia, and the National Guards are masters of the city.

Dublin, October 27.—The parties who have been imprisoned under the Habeas Corpus Act, have been liberated on bail, were bound by recognisances to appear at this commission. On Wednesday they received notice that they would not be called on by the Crown, and they need not appear. Mr. O'Higgins, Mr. Meany (of the Tribune), and Mr. Brennan (of the Felon), alone of all the prisoners confined in Belfast remain in custody.

The money market is much the same as before. The supply is abundant, and the demand limited. On call the eminent discount-house of Guerny and Co. have again announced to their customers that they can only allow two per cent. usance.

The foreign intelligence of to day attracts little or no interest, the attention of those who more especially watch the course of daily events being absorbed exclusively in the state of the Stock Exchange, where great excitement prevails.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT FROM INDIA.—The intelligence brought by the Overland Mail from India will come like a thunder clap upon our readers. Our dates are from Bombay to the 3rd October, and from Calcutta to the 13th September. It will be remembered that at our last advices Major Edwards, supported by a large division of troops under General Whish, was encamped under the walls of Moultan, and only waiting a battering train to commence the siege of that strong city. The English forces, including those of their allies, has been estimated, perhaps not correctly, at 23,000 men, with thirty guns. Besides these, Shere Singh, the Durbar leader of Lahore, had 3000 men under his command, and his fidelity, since his departure from Lahore in May last, seems not to have been doubted. The enemy in Moultan is supposed to have an army of 7000 to 12,000 men, and fifty-two guns.

Notwithstanding this apparently superior force on the British side, we regret to say, that whether it has been owing to a miscalculation of the strength of the enemy, who has had time to organize his plans, or whether the British General Whish has been unequal to the task of crushing the incipient rebellion, we have as yet not sufficient evidence to form an opinion, but it seems beyond a doubt that the British troops, after a perfectly ineffectual investment and bombardment of the city during seven days, attended with considerable loss of life, were compelled to retire on account of the inadequacy of their forces; and Shere Singh, who perceived that the English were unequal to the capture of the city, passed over to the enemy, and rendered the retirement of the British to a distance of 18 miles from the city altogether unavoidable. This perfidy on the part of Shere Singh is but one act of a general scheme of treachery to the British authorities throughout the whole of the Panjab.

It is alleged that the Sikhs are in full rebellion, not only in Moultan, and in the Hazareh country, at the very gates of India, but also in Peshawar, Pathan Kote, Noorpoor; and that even the complexity of Gholab Singh, the Maharajah of Cashmere is placed beyond a doubt. This, indeed, looks like rebellion. Already have several of the Sikh Sardars at Lahore been arrested, and the whole Durbar is suspected; and it only requires the Lahore country to declare against us, and we then shall have the entire territory of the Five Rivers upon our hands.—The news of the Cabul massacre, or of the Sikh invasion, is far outweighed in importance by the present unwelcome tidings. A military force of at least 30,000 to 40,000 men will be required to suppress this general movement.—They who thought the self-denial of the British praise-worthy, when Lord Hardinge refused to add the whole of the Panjab to our dominions in India, must now perceive their error; and it is clear that the whole country must, after this, be annexed to our former territories, if those precious conquests are to be retained.

Sirdar Chutter Singh, the father of Shere Singh, now the ally of Dewan Moolraj, of Hazareh district. The presence of Major Laurence may check the progress of rebellion in Peshawar; but the possession of Attock by the rebels would, we fear, be the signal

for a general combination against us in that quarter, supported, perhaps, by the wild, restless hordes from Afghanistan. As we have no official statement of the important events which this mail brings us, it would be premature to speak in a tone of alarm of such a widely-spread and suddenly formed confederacy against the British authority. The Indian press, as usual in such cases, rails unmercifully at the inefficiency and supineness of the governors and residents at head-quarters. The simple fact is, that the natives have taken advantage of the seasons, and have leagued against us; but we cannot doubt an instant but that Lord Gough will proceed *instantly* to the scene of danger, that all the available forces of India will be directed to the suppression of the rebellion without the delay of another moment, and, if needful, that the troops which have recently returned from the east will be replaced by ample reinforcements. These events are especially to be deplored at this moment, when business, both at Bombay and Calcutta, was steadily reviving. It will be seen by our advices that the Indian markets had been in a very active state, and it is to be hoped that vigorous measures will speedily restore tranquillity and confidence, and consolidate our authority throughout the whole of our vast East Indian colonies.

NOVASCOTIA.—The Hon. Wm. Frederick Des Barres, has been appointed one of the Assistant Judges of the Supreme Court, vacant by the death of Judge Hill; and the Hon. Alexander M'Dougall is the Solicitor General, and a member of the Executive Council.

A fire broke out in a house in Barrington street, in the city of Halifax, occupied by Mr. Jonas Hagar, a hatter, which was totally consumed. Mrs. Hagar unfortunately perished in the flames. She had been out of the house once or twice during the fire, but returned, it is supposed to look after her children—forgetting, probably, in her agitated state, that she had previously confided the youngest to the safe keeping of a neighbour; and rushing back with a mother's feeling to rescue the supposed missing ones, became bewildered in the smoke and flame, sunk exhausted upon a bed, and died.
