The Turkish Minister deems these demands inadmissible; the notes which have passed have been sent on to St. Petersburg, and once more there appears to be an interruption in the diplomatic relations between the Porte and Russia. The opinion we have thrown out long ago that the Emperor of Russia is only gaining time till the spring, when he will throw off the mask, and openly make some attempt against Turkey, has gained ground during the week; and the tone adopted by the ambassador of the Czar at the Porte is by no means tranquillising. The Italian refugees which Mr More O'Ferrell sent away from Malta have collected in great numbers at Pera, and give the Turkish authorities no little trouble. Mr Layard is prosecuting his antiquarian researches near Mossul with success. The city of St. Petersburg has been visited by a storm which swelled the waters of the Neva to such a height that when they subsided a two-masted ship was left high and dry across one of the streets. Great damage was done.

DEATH OF THE QUEEN DOWAGER.—The public will learn with regret that Queen Adelaide, whose piety and benevolence have endeared her to all classes of the community from the day of her arrival in this country, expired on Sunday morning, at seven minutes to two o'clock.

ITALY.—Symptoms of insubordination have manifested themselves among the Papal troops. Cries of 'Down with the priests' were recently raised by a regiment of dragoons.

The Treasury of Rome is insolvent; it is unable to meet the demand of the holders of Roman Bonds for the interest now due.

The Concordia of Turin, of the 8th states, on the faith of private correspondence that the colleges of Jesuits at Ferrara, Forli, and Faenza have been reopened, and that those of Tivoli and Loreto will soon follow. The fortress of Spoleto, according to this account, is full of political prisoners.

AUSTRIA AND HUNGARY.—Baron Haynau has issued orders to the courts martial to carry on the proceedings against all those implicated in the Hungarian insurrection, who, in obedience to his proclamation of the 1st of September, surrendered themselves to the authorities, without depriving them of their liberty, except where there are existing proofs of their having been guilty of some flagrant crime. The consequence is, that all those who voluntarily surrender themselves are now at liberty, and those who may in future do so will enjoy the same privilege.

The winter has commenced with great severity. A correspondent writing from Vienna on the 30th ultimo says the snow continues. Immense heaps encumber all the streets and squares. The fall seems to have been general throughout Central Europe. The north railroad is buried in many places by deep drifts, and communication with Prague and Berlin is completely cut off.

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

ROME, October 4.—The first interview of the Pope with Gen. Baraguay d'Hilliers has not led to the result which was anticipated. The general prolongs his stay at Naples. At this moment the return of his Holiness is again thrown into uncertainty. Without entering into the heart of the question with the general, the Pope is said to have given as the motive of his change of resolution, the necessity of delaying his entry into Rome until after the conclusion of a loan which would permit him to make his return coincident with the suppression of paper money. Doubtless that measure would be a most politic one at this moment, but there are two difficulties which render it very problematical—in the first place the realisation of the loan, and the next the quantity of paper in circulation. This cannot, therefore, be the real motive of this fresh delay in the return of the Pope, which is much to be regretted, as it tires the expectations of some and revives the hopes of others.

UNITED STATES.—The Message of the President was delivered to both houses of Congress on Monday week. We will refer to this document next week, when we shall give a synopsis of its contents.

IMPORTANT RUMOUR.—New York, December 22.—The Washington correspondent of the Herald states that he had obtained information that Mr Lawrence, our Minister to England, has communicated to the government at Washington the adjustment of the Nicaragua question, at least so far as to preclude any possibility of any difficulty growing out of it.

Lord Palmerston, it is said, had taken the most conciliatory position in regard to the whole matter.

DEATH.

At Northesk, on the 4th December, JOHN, CUPPAGE, a native of Ireland, aged 83. Mr Cuppage, had been very infirm for several months. Being left alone for a few minutes he unfortunately fell upon the hearth, and was so severely burnt that he survived only three days.

THE NORTHUMBERLAND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY'S Annual Exhibition of Domestic Manufactures, Grains, Dairy Produce, &c. &c FOR 1849.

The Northumberland Agricultural Society's GENERAL EXHIBITION, will take place at Chatham, in the School Room of Mr Howe, on the day of the Annual Meeting, being WEDNESDAY, the 16th day of January next. The undermentioned Premiums will be offered by the Society to competition on that day under the following Rules and Regulations. Articles intended for competition must be ready for entering by half-past 10 o'clock, and none will be received after half-past 11.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. That no Premium be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufacture which has not been wholly manufactured and prepared for Exhibition within the county.
2. That the articles brought for competition were manufactured, raised, or produced within one year from the time of competition.
3. That the prizes for Domestic Manufactures only, shall be open to General Competition, and that all persons entitled to a prize of Ten Shillings and upwards for the same, shall, before receiving the amount, pay the annual subscription of five shillings.
4. That no premium be awarded for Grain or Dairy Produce, unless to Members of the Society who have paid their Subscription.
5. That all persons bringing for Exhibition any article of Domestic Manufacture, Grain or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with statement setting forth, that the exhibitor is the owner of the article produced. If Domestic Manufacture, that the materials were produced in the county, and manufactured and prepared by (naming the person) within the preceding year, and that the same had not before been offered for Exhibition. If Grain and Seeds,—That the article was raised by the Exhibitor on the premises occupied by him during the past year; describing, for the information of the Society, its culture and production; and that the same had not before been exhibited for a Premium; and if Dairy Produce a similar statement, subscribed by the owner. These Certificates to be handed to the Committee when the article is being entered for competition.
6. That no individual who is awarded the first prize on any article exhibited on the occasion, shall be entitled to a second prize on the same description of article.
