NEW BRUNSWICK.—*The Telegraph.*—The Courier furnishes the following additional particulars with regard to the arrest of Anderson:—

On his way to, and while in the Watch House, Anderson confessed to having been at the same work the week before as he had now been detected at, and stated that he had been well paid for it, as there were parties who did not mind four or five hundred or even a thousand pounds to have their ends accomplished, and that if he was sent to the Penitentiary, he would go there at the rate of £300 or £400 a year.

He underwent an examination at the Police Office on Monday, before the Stipendiary Magistrate, B. L. Peters Esq., and after a lengthy investigation, was committed to jail, to take his trial for felony at the Court of Oyer and Terminer, to be held in this City next month.

On examining his person, a letter was found in his pocket, which he had written in the watch house, apprising Mr Till of his having been " nabbed at last," and requesting him to come and see him.

From this letter, and other evidence, and from facts and documents which have since been discovered, there is no doubt of the identity of some of the parties in this city who have been aiding and abetting in this nefarious business, and it is believed that some clue has also been discovered, in a party at a distance who is equally guilty in the affair.

There being a question whether, under the Law incorporating the Company, the crime is punishable as felony, it not being embodied as such in the Criminal Law passed at the last Session of the Legislature, His Honor the Chief Justice has ordered that the prisoner may be liberated upon giving bail in the sum of £1000—himself in £500, and two sureties in £250 each—for his appearance at the January Court; but as yet, we believe, the required securities have not been produced.

Professor Johnston delivered a lecture at the Mechanics' Institute at Saint John, last Friday, on the agricultural capabilities of this Province. The Courier thus briefly notices the lecture.

The Professor was nearly two hours in going over his important and interesting details, which in several points were explained by maps; and we are happy to add, the results of the present investigations and inquiries of this truly scientific lecturer, with regard to the agricultural capabilities of this Province, were of a highly flattering character—proving, as they did, that the average production per acre of wheat, oats, barley, potatoes and turnips was greater in this Province than in Upper Canada, or the celebrated agricultural States of Ohio and New York.

As Mr Blatch was in attendance, taking notes, we hope the Press, at a subsequent day, will give us the substance of the Professor's remarks.

Mr Needham delivered his second lecture on Law Reform, on Thursday last.

A Petition to the Legislature is being handed about in Fredericton for signatures, praying for the repeal of the Act, incorporating that city.

Change of Mail Days. We understand that the Mail which was despatched from this City last week for England, did not reach Halifax in time to be forwarded—The Steamer Europa having arrived early on Friday, after a run of only sixty four hours from New York, and proceeded soon after on the voyage to Liverpool. To prevent such serious disappointments in future, the Mails for England will hereafter be closed some twelve hours earlier than formerly. NOVASCOTIA.—The Halifax papers notice the death of Mr William Valentine, Artist, a respectable inhabitant of that city.

FROM BERMUDA.—The Steamer Ospray arrived last evening from Bermuda, bringing advices to the 15th. The only item of interest furnished, is the arrival of the H. M. steamship Hecate, with Sir Edward Bulwer, Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States, on the 11th, all well, and would sail again for Washington on the 15th or 16th, after receiving an allowance of coal.—*Halifax Sun, December 19.*

P. E. ISLAND.—The Governor of this Island has set aside Thursday, the 20th inst., as a day of General Thanksgiving.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. That no Premium be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufacture which has not been wholly manufactured and prepared for Exhibition within the county.
2. That the articles brought for competition were manufactured, raised, or produced within one year from the time of competition.
3. That the prizes for Domestic Manufactures only, shall be open to General Competition, and that all persons entitled to a prize of Ten Shillings and upwards for the same, shall, before receiving the amount, pay the annual subscription of five shillings.
4. That no premium be awarded for Grain or Dairy Produce, unless to Members of the Society who have paid their Subscription.
5. That all persons bringing for Exhibition any article of Domestic Manufacture, Grain or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with statement setting forth, that the exhibitor is the owner of the article produced, if Domestic Manufacture, that the materials were produced in the county, and manufactured and prepared by (naming the person) within the preceding year, and that the same had not before been offered for Exhibition. If Grain and Seeds,—That the article was raised by the Exhibitor on the premises occupied by him during the past year; describing, for the information of the Society, its culture and production; and that the same had not before been exhibited for a Premium; and if Dairy Produce a similar statement, subscribed by the owner. These Certificates to be handed to the Committee when the article is being entered for competition.
6. That no individual who is awarded the first prize on any article exhibited on the occasion, shall be entitled to a second prize on the same description of article.
