THIS DAY'S MAIL.

From the St. John Courier of Saturday last.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—ANOTHER SEIZURE.—The Revenue Officers at this Port made a seizure this week of 400 gallons of spirits, illicitly imported.

We regret to learn that a fire occurred at the works of the York and Carleton Mining Company, at Woodstock, on Wednesday last, which destroyed the top and engine house, and the casting-house. The machinery is partially damaged, but the furnace is uninjured. Loss not yet ascertained, but supposed to be about £2000. The works, we understand, are expected to be in operation again before the close of the year.

CANADA.—The Harvest for 1849.—The harvest just gathered is far more abundant than any with which Canada has been blessed in any previous year. The breadth of wheat sown last season in many districts of the Upper Province was much more extensive than in any former season. The crop of fall wheat is generally good, the spring wheat middling, and the yield on the whole will be much more than an average. If we could it advantageous for us to send more than a million of bushels of wheat to the United States last year, we shall send a much larger quantity this year, when our grain will enter the English market on the same footing as foreign. The aggregate amount of our surplus wheat this year will not be far short of double what it was last year.

CHOLERA.—The number of deaths at Boston last week was but 24, and a large portion of them were out of the city proper.

In Bangor there was but one new case on Friday.

In New York last week there were 20 deaths from cholera, 353 in all.

Montreal, Sept. 25.—The Cabinet held a council to day, but their deliberations were kept secret. Mr. Merritt will leave town in a day or two, it is said, for the purpose of meeting Lord Elgin; to whom he will communicate the decision of the cabinet in reference to the seat of government.

UNITED STATES.—Some sharp correspondence had occurred between Mr. Crampton, British Charge at Washington, and the American Government, in reference to a grant of lands made to certain Americans by the Government of Nicaragua,—the right to dispose of which the British Government disputes.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—It is stated that M. Poussin, through the interposition of Mr. Crampton, the British Charge, has submitted a conciliatory proposition to our Government, in reference to the late disturbances. General

Taylor has, however, promptly refused permitting Poussin to resume official intercourse, until he receives further advices from the French Government.

THE HIBERNIA.—We learn from the New York Commercial that the repairs of this steamer will be completed by Thursday. She will sail on Saturday next. The injury received by her is much more serious than at first supposed. She was found to have lost fifty feet of her main keel, eight feet of stem, aprons and deadwoods—the rock having penetrated the bow about ten feet. It is supposed she made fifteen tons of water per minute—sufficient to have sunk the vessel if five minutes' cessation of the injection pumps, by which she was kept free, had occurred.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1st—Teams must be on the ground by nine, ready to commence at Ten o'clock, precisely.

2nd—All persons who may have gained the First Prize for two years, shall not be eligible to compete the next year.

3rd—Three Judges to be appointed previously, by the Board of Directors, and their names announced by the Secretary on the morning of competition. They shall not, however, appear on the field till the work be completed.

3rd—The Society will provide for the expense of ferrying all horses that have been actually engaged in the competition of the day.

CATTLE SHOW.

The Cattle Show of the Northumberland Agricultural Society will take place in the Town of Chatham, on the same day as the Ploughing Match, being THURSDAY, the 4th day of October next, when the undermentioned Premiums will be competed for by the members of the Society, under the following Rules and Regulations.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1st—All Cattle and Horses must be on the ground, and ready to be entered for competition by 11 o'clock, A. M., and none can be entered after 12.

2nd—Cattle and Horses brought for Exhibition must have been raised in the County, and have been the property of the Exhibitor at least three months previously to the day of competition, and they must be accompanied by a certificate proving the breed and age of each animal.

3d—That three Judges shall be appointed on the morning of competition, and announced by the Secretary.

4th—That the decision of any two of the Judges shall be final; and that in all cases, whether there be any competition or not, it shall be in the power of the Judges to withhold a premium, if they deem the objects exhibited unworthy of it.

5th—The ferrage of all Cattle entered for competition, and having to cross the river, will be provided for by the Society.
