CANADA .- The papers from this Province are discussing with a good deal of bitterness, the debates in Parliament relative to the late disturbance in Montreal. To an extra of the Montreal Gazette we are indebted for the answer of the Colonial Secretary to the Petitions presented from Canada to the government, praying for the removal of the Governor General, which was intrusted to the care of Sir A.

### TO SIR ALLAN NAPIER McNAB.

DOWNING STREET, 13th June, 1849. Sir.—I am directed by Earl Grey to inform you, that he has duly laid before the Queen the Petitions to her Majesty, which you delivered to him for that purpose on Saturday last. These petitions are from the inhabitants of Toronto, from the inhabitants of Kingston, from the residents of Westen and its vicinity, from the residents in the Newsystla cinity, from the residents in the Newcastle district, and Prescot county, from the Ottawa district and from the city of Montreal. The Petitioners pray for the recall of the present Governor General of Canada, for the dissolution of the Parliament of that province, and for the disallowance by Her Majesty, of the Act lately passed by that Parliament, for the indemnification of all parties in Lower Canada whose property was destroyed during the rebellion, in year 1837 and 1838.

Lord Grey has no doubt that the persons who have signed these petitions have been induced to do so by a sincere apprehension that of the act in question should be allowed to come into operation it would have the effect of encouraging disloyalty for the future, by making compensation to those who have been guilty of Rebellion, for losses brought upon themselves by their crimes; but his Lordship themselves by their crimes; but his Lordship directs me to inform you, that he directs thro' you to convey he same assurance to those who have confided to you their petitions for trans-mission to her Majesty, that if the act had ap-peared on a careful examination of its provisons to be justly open to this objection, not only would her Mejesty's servants have been prepared to advise the Queen to have exercised her prerogative, by disallowing it, but they are also convinced that it would never have received ved the assent, either of the Governor General of Canada on her Mojesty's behalf, or of the majority of the Representatives of the People of that Province.

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of that Province.

I am directed to refer you to the answer of the Governor General to the address from the county of Hastings, as containing an expression of Lord Elgin's views upon this subject, in which her Majesty's servants entirely concur. In that answer, in adverting to this act of the Provincial Patliament he expresses his firm belief that the Representatives of the people in Canada 'did not no intend passing it to countenance rebellion, or to compensate the losses of persons guilty of the henious crime of treason,' and he adds 'that it was under this conviction that he assented to the bill, and in this Viction that he assented to the bill, and in this spirit only could be ever consent as the head of the Executive Government to give effect to it." Lord Grey directs me to express his hope that this official declaration of the views of the Governor General in Canada, which is entirely approved by the advisers of her Majesty, will remove the blame and calm the indignation which, from a misapprehension as to its charand he appeals with coofidence to the feelings of Loyalty which animate the Petitioners, and to your own well-known devotion to the British Crown and desire to promote the welfare of Canada, in calling upon them to assist Her Majesty's Government in endeavoring to maintain the public psace and authority of the law, and to allay the existing agitation which is produced to the state of ducing so much injury to commerce, the public credit, and all the most important interests of the Province of Canada.

The Attorney General, in reply to a question by Dr Nichol, stated his opinion of the Act as under. It seems that that officer cares very httle for Lord Elgin's belief, or Lord Grey's, as expressed in the Hastings address. And yet we are told to receive it and be thankful.

The Attorney General declining to enter into the general merits of the question, stated his construction of the act. The question of Dr Nichel, he observed was twofold—first, could the Crown qualify the act? He answered, unquestionably the Crown could not; it could only sent to or negative the act. Secondly, has Lard Elgin power to give instructions varying from the spirit of the act? He replied that Lord Elgin derived his authority from the act, his instructions must follow his power; he could not delegate more authority than he possessed, and could not therefore, by instructions to the commissioners, vary the act. Then what was the true intent and meaning of the act? It would have been impracticable to frame a statue, that should restrict compensation to persons who were not rebels. Wes a man to prove himself not to be rebel? The act, therefore, excluded persons convicted of high treason, whose blood was corrupted, and conviction was the limited, as was supposed, to cases tried in coarts of common law, for when martial law was proclaimed, convictions by court marshalfell within the act. If it were said that a rebel hight get compensation under this act, it been expressly excluded, since it would be an !

question of a sufficiency of proof .- Under the words 'anjust, unnecessary, or wanton destruction of property,' Lord Elgin had a right to instruct the commissioners to make inquiry inte the circumstance of all claims, and those words gave a much greater latitude in dealing with here.
