by certain parties, to spread to an alarming extent, doing damage which in some cases c an never be repaired. We wonder that experience does not teach persons the very great impropriety of setting fires at this season of the year; and as the present law on the subject remains almost a dead letter on the statute book, would it not be well to call the attention of the Legislature to some more summary mode of precedure with those who thus recklesrly endanger their neighbors' property?

EUROPEAN NEWS.

IMPROVEMENT OF THE NAVIGATION OF THE RIVER ST. JOHN. - We copy the following paragraph from the Fredericton Head Quarters of Wednesday last: -"We are gratified to learn that Captain Burt of the Royal Engineers, accompanied by John Grant, Esq., of the Crown Land Department of this Province, are now engaged in a minute survey of the River Saint John, for the purpose of preparing a working plan of the contemplated improvements, which are to open up a more speedy and direct communication with our Canadian Brethern. Capt. Burt has, in addition to his acquirements in the Royal Engineer Department, the advantage of a prolonged residence in Canada, and an intimate acquaintance with the magnificent public improvements which have been carried on in this province for the last eight or ten years. The advantages of such a survey are too obvious to require comment.

The same paper says: -" We are happy to say, that we still continue to receive the most satisfactory accounts, from all quarters of the Province, respecting the Potato crop, and with the exception of grass we believe the crops of every description will be found beyond an average. The following is from a gentleman residing at Hillsborough, under the date of 31st altimo.

ANOTHER COLLISION .- The Royal Mail Steamer Canada, whilst on her last passage frem Liverpool to New York, ran foul of the brigantine Jane, on the 24th August, bound from New York to Newfoundland. The steamer's jib boom was carried away by the brig's mainmast. The Jane had no light up, although the watch on board of her said they they saw the steamer's light full one hour before the collision took place; and had they taken a similar precaution, the accident would not have occurred.

HALIFAX .- The Halifax Sun states that two additional escapes from the Provincial Penitentiary occurred during the past week.

The Novascotian of Wednesday last contains the following paragraph :- The quiet of the City was disturbed on Saturday night last, by a very serions riot in Water street. It apyears that a soldier was absent from the Barracks without leave, and suspicion was aroused that he had deserted. The piquet being sent for him, he was tracked to a nest at the head

of Fairbanks' wharf, to which the pursuers were refused an entrance. The house was apparently full of men quaffing the intoxicating cup, who, upon being unceremoniously disturbed, and desirous of harboring and protecting the runaway, immediately commenced an onslaught upon the military, by throwing brickbats and other missiles .. As the soldiers did not use their more dangerous weapons to any extent, they certainly fared the worst in the fight. Two or three were very seriously wound ed, and are now in the Infirmary. The deserter, we believe, has yet eluded his pursuers. We heard something of a subsequent disturbance to the above, in which a red coat, abroad with leave, was made the receivergeneral of a sound drubbing at the hands of several rowdies.

QUEBEC .- The Chronicle of the 29th ult. states that the heat in that city was excessive. On the 28th the wind suddenly changed to the eastward, and the thermometer fell instantly 10 or 12 degrees. There was a fire at Lorette and Beauport on the morning of the 28th, and it was thought that they had been caused by the lightning, which was vividly close and fre-
