THE RIOT IN ST. JOHN .- Last week we gave all the information we had respecung the disastrous and disgraceful riot which occurred in the above named city on the 12th instant; and to-day we publish the remarks of several of the papers | o the subject, with a few more particulars. It was a bloody affair, and from what we can learn from parties who have been on the spot, there is every reason to suspect, that the number of persons killed and wounded will never be correctly ascertained. The following 'incidents in the late tragedy,' are taken from the Morning News of Monday :-

A man was seen picking up a stone, a person with a pistol in his hand pursued him; the man stambled behind a pile of rubbish—his pursuer placed a pistol at his back and shot him through the heart.

A man was holding up one of the posts that sustained the green twigs placed along Dock street—he was marked, and shot dead on the

Another man was seen lying on the Portland Market House platform in the agonies of death, having the rattles in his throat—a gun shot wound was in his breast.

It was common to see persons in Dock street load their guns and fire as they went along. The women were as busy as the men in ga-

thering brick bats and stones to make use of.

A man attempted to seize one of the banners

in the procession, and we are informed a person connected with it, drew his sword and severed his arm completely from his body.

Several women in passing along near York Point, received balls through the tops of their honners.

Wherever stones were seen to come from,

A field piece was drawn up by a company of the Royal Artillery at 10 o'clock at night, and placed at the foet of Dock street, nearly opposite Mr. Sharp's Drug store, to be ready in case of emergency, to rake the entire street.

A man dangerously wounded was taken into an Apothecary's store, and while getting his wounds dressed, a person weut in and stated that two more had just been shot—the wounded man in tones of exultation cried out, 'God Prolong my misery until I hear of a dozen prolong my misery until I hear of a dozen more.' What must be in the heart of such a man! Is there no religious malice cherished here?

About half-past 8 o'clock some fiend got over into Doherty & McTavish's yard, and deliberately fired a gun into the back windows, the ball passed into the front store and lodged

A little boy was stanling on a platform near the soldiers—a shot was fired from the crowd opposite, and took effect in the boy's foot, so that he will be a cripple for life.

The number of shots fired are supposed by

persons residing in the vicinity of York Point, to be at least five hundred.

The blood of the people is still boiling—and we believe the trouble is not yet over.

We copy the declaration of independence, enlire, which bears date the 16th June last.

Unanimous Declaration of the Seven Northern States of the Sierra Madre of Mexico - When, in he course of human events. it becomes necessary for one nation to dissolve the political bonds which unite it to another, to assume separately among the powers of he earth the position to which the laws of pafure, and nature's God, entitle it, a decent res-Pect for the opioton of mankind requires that Il should state the causes which impelit to the

The history of the present and past govern ment of Mexico is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having for their direct Object, the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these States. To prove this, we present the following facts to an impartial world-

1st-Westied with political changes, which have been heretolore nothing more than continued oppressions, exercised by new hunds, declare ourselves tree.

2d-Wearied with the exactions of the goveroment, which have been made solely for the of perpetuating the power of the usuris of the liberties of the people, we declare

Sd-Wearied with the same armies which have been collected solely to oppress and an-nihilate the industry of all, except that of the Oppressors, we declare curselves free.

dih-Wearied that our beloved religion, coustantly threatened by bayonets, is fettered in its design of benevolence and public instruc-tion, we declare ourselves free.

5 h-Wearied that the people, in the midst of their vast domains, are denied the right of individual possession, we declare ourselves

6th-Wearied with the promises which have been made to our children, who anxiously await in vain of their rulers the right of edu-cation, we declare ourselves free.

7th-Wearied that our aged fathers are sinking gradually into the grave, like the brutes, without any alleviation, we declare ourselves

8th-Wearied that while misery and poverty prevail everywhere, the usurpers amass power and gold, we declare ourselves free.

9th-Wearied with the national declaration that slavery should not be tolerated on our soil, while the domestic service is an odious, horrible and cruel system, and prevails without al-l-viation and without parallel, we declare our-

wherefore we, the people of the seven northern Sietes of Mexico, appealing to the Supreme Jodge of the Universe for the rectitude of our intentions, now solemaly proclaim and declare 'that these United States are free and independent.' That they are absolved from all allegiance towards the Mexican government, and that all connection between us has ceased, is and ought to be entirely dissolved. And consequently, as free and independent States, we have the right to levy troops of war, make peace, form alliances, establish commerce, and perform any other act or thing commerce, and perform any other act or thing which appertains of right to free and independent States. And to sustain this declaration, with a firm reliance upon Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.
