The New York Journal of Commerce pub-lishes the following extract of a letter from Montreal :-

"We have had a fearful time of it with cho-lera, for the last three or four weeks, both here and at Quebec. For some time, as many as from 30 to 60 died in a day, in each of the two cities. This would be equivalent to 400 or 500 a day in so populous a city as New York. At Quebec they are atill losing from 30 to 40 a day;

there the mortality is much less, and we hope that the epidemic is gradually leaving us." *Buried Treasure*.—We are informed by Fa-vor, of the Eastport Express, that the company formed in this city for the purpose of raising the relics of the British brig Plumper, are likeiy to be successful. They have been at work but a short time, and have already obtained quite an amount of specie, together with sun-dry other valuable articles.
