Notice to the Public.

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, having been pleased to issue a Warrant, dated the 5th March, authorising a reduction in the rates of Postage on Letters transmitted direct by British Packets between the United Kingdom and any part of British North America, under which Warrant, on and after 15th April next, Letters forwarded from the United Kingdom to New Brunswick, and vice versa, will be chargeable with a uniform rate of 1 d sterling, when not exceeding half an ounce in weight; a Letter weighing above half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce will be liable to 1s 11d, or two rates, and so on according to the scale at present in operation. The payment of this Postage will remain optional with the sender.
