THIS DAY'S MAIL.

The mail did not arrive until three o'clock. Why it was delayed so long beyond its proper time, we are unable to conjecture. We make a few selections from the papers.

IMPORTANT FROM HAYTI.—An arrival at Philadelphia from Saint Domingo, brings intelligence that on the 26th August, after some unmeaning preliminaries, Solouque, the President of the Republic, was declared emperor, the legislative council of the Island having conferred that dignity upon him. On that day he, with his wife and child, repaired to the Catholic Church at Port au Prince, where Solouque, aping the style of Napoleon, placed upon his own head the imperial crown, and he and his wife were proclaimed emperor and empress.

Captain Cutts, of the brig Hayti, at New York from Port au Prince, states that Solouque had been declared emperor on the 2nd inst., under the title of Faustin first, emperor of Hayti, one and indivisible, and that the coronation would take place on the 17th. Great rejoicings had taken place. The nobility, princes, dukes, lords, barons, &c., would be named in a few days.

CHOLERA AT BANGOR.—Official reports—15th, 7 P. M. 10 cases 6 deaths; 16th, 7 cases 5 deaths; 17th, 10 cases 8 deaths.

The Southern papers continue to bring bad accounts of the cotton crops.

RUMORED RECALL OF THE FRENCH MINISTER.—New York, Sept 19.—It is stated that M. Poussin's recall has been decided upon by the French Government, and M. Montholon, son of Gen. Montholon, has been appointed his successor.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The report of the committee of Management of the New Brunswick Colonial Association, published in the last Courier, acknowledges the receipt of the Central Society of the British American League, of a communication which, we understand, invites the Association to send Delegates to a meeting of Delegates from the different Provinces, to take place at Montreal on the 24th October, to deliberate upon and discuss the subjects of the foregoing Resolutions. We are not prepared to express an opinion on the question of a union of the Provinces, yet we are confident that important benefits must result from any movement tending to unite the Provinces in deliberations for their mutual welfare; and we sincerely hope that the Colonial Association will adopt the recommendation in the report of its Committee, and send Delegates to the Montreal meeting, for the purpose of discussing the propriety of the proposed union.—*Courier.*

DISTURBANCES IN CANADA.—*Montreal, Sept. 19.*—At Bytown, on Monday last, at a public meeting called by the Ministerialists to address Lord Elgin, the opposition were present in full force, and the Ministerial President of the meeting forced to leave the chair. Resolutions were carried condemning Lord Elgin and the Ministry. Much firing took place, and several wounded or killed. The military finally restored order.

Lord Elgin was at the Clifton House, Niagara Falls, on the 14th. He is stated to have been received with much enthusiasm by the inhabitants. He did not stop at Brockville, where Mr Gowan's party threatened to greet him with a black flag, and to assassinate any one who should venture to take it down. In anticipation of his Lordship's visit to Toronto, a similar determination appears to pervade his opponents. A placard calling upon them to organize and arm, had been issued, headed 'Awake! Treachery and Treason!' in which his Lordship is styled rebel-rewarding Elgin.

HALIFAX.—The Temperance Hall in Poplar Grove is rapidly advancing to the completion of the outside work. It is boarded in, partly shingled and painted. It bids fair to be an ornament to the city, and when completed will supply a desideratum long felt among us, —a large room for public meetings with quietness and suitable accommodation. The spirited projectors are deserving of great commendation for their laudable efforts.

Mr Charles Spurr, a young man of much promise, in charge of the mills of Messrs. Allison & Spurr, in the Parish of Lancaster, N. B. was accidentally and violently struck on the right side by a piece of board from a circular saw, on the 27th inst. and died on the following morning. He was a native of Nova Scotia, aged 23.—*Wesleyan.*

CALIFORNIA.—The Cholera is carrying off 15 victims per day at Santa Martha. The disease has wholly disappeared from Carthagen.

Rich deposits of gold had been found on the North Fork of the Rio Americano.

IRELAND.—An article in Blackwood's Magazine says, that at least 250,000 perished by famine in Ireland in 1847, in consequence of the loss of the Potato crop, notwithstanding the British government expended fifty millions of dollars in purchasing food for the population and extensive donations were received from abroad.

- 1st—Teams must be on the ground by Nine, ready to commence at Ten o'clock, precisely.

- 3rd—Three Judges to be appointed previously, by the Board of Directors, and their names announced by the Secretary on the morning of competition. They shall not, however, appear on the field till the work be completed.
- 3rd—The Society will provide for the expense of ferrying all horses that have been actually engaged in the competition of the day.

CATTLE SHOW.

The Cattle Show of the Northumberland Agricultural Society will take place in the Town of Chatham, on the same day as the Ploughing Match, being THURSDAY, the 4th day of October next, when the undermentioned Premiums will be competed for by the members of the Society, under the following Rules and Regulations.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

- 1st—All Cattle and Horses must be on the ground, and ready to be entered for competition by 11 o'clock, A. M., and none can be entered after 12.
- 2nd—Cattle and Horses brought for Exhibition must have been raised in the County, and have been the property of the Exhibitor at least three months previously to the day of competition, and they must be accompanied by a certificate proving the breed and age of each animal.
- 3rd—That three Judges shall be appointed on the morning of competition, and announced by the Secretary.
- 4th—That the decision of any two of the Judges shall be final; and that in all cases, whether there be any competition or not, it shall be in the power of the Judges to withhold a premium, if they deem the objects exhibited unworthy of it.
- 5th—The ferridge of all Cattle entered for competition, and having to cross the river, will be provided for by the Society.
