

Saints, the claim of infallibility for the Church, the superstitious use of the sign of the cross, the muttering of the Liturgy so as to disguise the language in which it is written, the recommendation of penance and absolution—all these things are pointed out by clergymen of the Church of England as worthy of adoption, and are now openly reprehended by the Bishop of London in his charge to the clergy of his diocese.

What, then, is the danger to be apprehended from a foreign prince of no great power, compared to the danger within the gates from the unworthy sons of the Church of England herself.

I have little hope that the propounders and framers of these innovations will desist from their insidious course. But I rely with confidence on the people of England. And I will not bafe a jot of heart or hope so long as the glorious principles and the immortal martyrs of the Reformation shall be held in reverence by the great mass of a nation which looks with contempt on the mummeries of superstition, and with scorn at the laborious endeavors which are now making to confine the intellect and enslave the soul.—I remain with great respect, &c.,

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

Paris, Thursday Evening.—The President's message has been most warmly applauded in the provinces. The advices from Germany were more favorable, in consequence of which the Bourse was firm, and a good deal done.

Germany.—There is no later intelligence of importance from Hesse.

Berlin, Nov. 12.—Great discontent prevailed respecting the Government policy, but it was not unlikely that a change in the Cabinet might occur. The people were watching the Ministerial movements with great attention and distrust. The German Reformers says, that several Austrian agents had been trying to persuade the inhabitants of Silesia of the advantages they would derive from an Austrian occupation of the country.

Austria.—The Ministerial journal's correspondent continues to uphold the right of the Austrian Cabinet, and to pass the severest strictures in the policy of the Berlin statesmen. The Lloyd's newspaper cannot believe in the possibility of the preservation of peace.

A Cabinet Council was held at the Foreign-office this afternoon. On Change to-day there appeared to be but one opinion—that the peace of Europe would be preserved; nevertheless, it was generally admitted that the warlike demonstrations in Germany have very much unsettled commerce and some time must elapse before full confidence will be restored.

United States News.

Disastrous Fire at Medford.—We learn from the Boston Mail, that Medford, a Village five miles from that city, was visited by a most destructive fire on Thursday last, which reduced a large and populous section of it to ashes, rendering some forty families homeless, and destroying property to the amount of near \$100,000. So fast did the flames spread that it was barely possible to escape with life and several hair-breadth escapes are noticed of women who seized their children and hurried with them into the street with nothing but their night-clothes on.—St. John Newsbrs.

CALIFORNIA.

The steamer Crescent City arrived at New York on Thursday with two weeks later news from California. She brought three hundred and eighty passengers, and \$1,000,000 in gold dust.

The Crescent City did not stop at Kingston on her return, on account of the cholera. Over 1,500 deaths had occurred in that city in three weeks, and six hundred in the interior.

The new Captain General of Cuba, General Don Jose de la Concha, arrived at Havana in the Spanish steamship Caledonia on the 12th instant, and took charge of the government of the Island. On Saturday he reviewed seven thousand regular troops on the Pasado de Tacon.

Colonial News.

New Brunswick:

Public Meeting.—We give below the official account of the adjourned public meeting held in the County Court House on Saturday evening last. The proceedings at this meeting were characterized by the utmost unanimity until the second resolution came under discussion, when some difference of opinion occurred about the propriety of interfering with the action of the Corporation, and their powers to restrain the erection of wooden buildings within certain limits. The resolution was, however, carried three to one, and the Corporation have since published a Bye-Law carrying out the powers which it is supposed the Act of Incorporation confers upon them, reserving the right to deal with houses already in process of erection; and as far as we can judge, they have acted in conformity to the wishes of a majority of the meeting to which we refer. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor presided over the meeting with the utmost urbanity and good humour, frequently combatting the views advanced by the legal gentlemen who addressed the Chair,

and more than once stated his own views in a clear and perspicuous manner. At the close of the meeting three cheers were given for the Queen and three more for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Closing of the Navigation.—The river opposite this city froze over during last night, and the ice, with the exception of that along the shore, is now stationary.—Head Quarters.

The Telegraph Line between this City and Fredericton, is now complete and in working order. The first despatch from Fredericton by the wires was received on Friday, announcing a snow storm there. The line has been constructed under the immediate superintendence of D. B. Stevens, Esq. Secretary and Superintendent of the New Brunswick lines, and is stated to be substantially erected. The charge, we learn, is to be 6d. for ten words. The line will be found very useful, particularly during the sitting of the Legislature, when despatches will be daily and hourly transmitted to and from the Seat of Government.

On Thursday night last we had the first snow storm of the season, when snow fell to the depth of two or three inches, a portion of which still remains on the ground.—St. John Observer.

The Right Rev. Bishop Dollard has commenced the erection of a new Church on the high ground near the residence of the Hon. R. L. Hazen.—Morning News.

Novascotia.

Public Improvements for the ensuing year are quite commonly talked of in the city. The surveys and plans for the new Barracks at Fort Needham, have been returned to the Engineer department of this garrison, approved of, and it may fairly be assumed that the work will be prosecuted with vigour. The new Market House is in good hands, and we may soon expect to see a notice for tenders to build it. We have heard of several of our citizens who are going to put their improvements through in good shape—including Messrs. Silver, Morton, &c. What with the railway and all these contemplated improvements going into operation next year, we really fear that the obstructives will burst their boilers from sheer envy and disappointment.

The London Times of a recent date, contains a capital communication above the signature of 'A Novascotian,' relative to the withdrawal from Halifax of the alternate Mail Steamer.

The storm of Thursday night last, appears to have been one of the most violent that has been experienced in this Province for the last ten years. To the eastward the snow fell to the depth of two feet on the mountains.—Hyde's Stage which ought to have reached Truro on Friday morning at 9 o'clock, did not arrive until late that evening, although a team of six fine horses was yoked to a light waggon conveying only three passengers! The storm was very destructive to the Telegraph Wires, the snow lodging on them, and the frost proving pretty severe, the gale acting upon the surface, caused them to come down in every direction. We have not heard of any damage on the coast—except the Lady Ogle having lost her masts—but we are fearful that the shipping on the coast have suffered severely.—Novascotian.

The Northumberland Agricultural Society's GENERAL EXHIBITION will take place in the Town of Newcastle, on THURSDAY, the 16th day of January.

The undermentioned Premiums will be offered by the Society to competition on that day, under the following

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. No premium will be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufacture, which has not been wholly manufactured and prepared for Exhibition within the County.

2. That the articles brought for competition were manufactured, raised, or produced within one year from the date of competition.

3. That the prizes for Domestic Manufactures only, shall be open to general competition; and that all persons entitled to a prize of Ten Shillings and upwards for the same, shall, before receiving the amount, pay the annual subscription of Five Shillings.

4. That no premium be awarded for Grain or Dairy Produce, unless to Members of the Society who have paid their subscriptions.

5. That all persons bringing for Exhibition any article of Domestic Manufacture, Grain or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with a statement setting forth, that the Exhibitor is the owner of the article produced. If Domestic Manufacture, that the materials were produced in the County, and manufactured and prepared by (naming the person) within the preceding year, and that the same had not before been offered for Exhibition. If Grain and Seeds,—that the article was raised by the Exhibitor on the premises occupied by him during the past year; describing, for the information of the Society, its culture and production; and that the same had not before been exhibited for a Premium: and if Dairy Produce a similar statement, subscribed by the owner. These Certificates to be handed to the Committee when the article is being entered for competition.

6. That no individual who is awarded the first prize on any article exhibited on the occasion, shall be entitled to a second prize on the same description of article.
