# Northumberland Agricultural Society.

At a Meeting of the Board of the Northum-beriand Agricultural Society, held on Tauks-park, the 11th April, 1850, the following Re-gulations and Restrictions, respecting the erec-tion of a Carding, Fulling and Dressing Ma-chine, for which the Society has offered a "The object of the Society being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a conventent place in the Parish of Chathan or Newcastle, for the Carding, Fulling, and Dressing the Wool and Cloth produced and adde in the County, they will require parties on the most recent and most approved princi-ples, for Garding, Fulling, and Dressing Wool and Cloth, and on such a scale as will be sui-able for the wants of this County at least; to which the Society is desirous that Dyeing to be completed, and in successful and efficient operation, and answering the purposes for which it is required, on or before the first day of series to State. "The competions for the Premium to send

of September, 1851. "The competitors for the Premium to send their applications to the S-cretary on or before the first day of June next, staing the size and description of the buildings, the different descriptions of machinery they intend and will descriptions of machinery they intend and will agree to provide and put in operation by the time limited, and the situation where the es-tablishment is intended to be placed. The Board will determine to which of the appli-cants the premium shall be given. Immediate-ly alter adjudging the Premium, the £50 will be given to the successful competitor, on an approved Joint Noie, payable with interest, on the filteenth day of September, 1851; which Note will be delivered up and cancelled on the Certificate of Alexander Goodfellow, Alexan-der Jessamine, and John Norman, or any two Certificate of Alexander Goodfellow, Alexan-der Jessamine, and John Normen, or any two of them, (who are appointed Judges for that purpose) that the establishment is in fall and efficient operation, according to the true intent of the above Regulations. Watt, Esg., Newcastle, John Porter, Esg., Douglastown, and Mr Andrew Danean, Chat-ham. It being understood, that the Society does not guarantee the Garden Seeds 'as good.'
