## Northumberland Agricultural Seciety.

At a Meeting of the Board of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, held on Thurs-bay, the 11th April, 1850, the following Re-gulations and Restrictions, respecting the erec-tion of a Carding, Fulling and Dressing Ma-chine, for which the Society has offered a

chine, for which the Society has offered a Fremium of £50, were manimously adepted:

"The object of the Seciety being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a convenient place in the Parish of Chatham or Newcastle, for the Carding, Fulling, and Dressing the Wool and Cioth produced and made in the County, they will require parties competing for the Premium to previde suitable Buildings, and the accessary Machinery, on the most recent and most approved principles, for Carding, Fulling, and Dressing Wool ples, for Carding, Fulling, and Dressing Wool and Cloth, and on such a scale as will be suit-able for the wants of this County at least; to which the Society is desirous that Dyeing should be added. The whole establishment to be completed, and in successful and efficient operation, and answering the purposes for which it is required, on or before the first day

of September, 1851.

"The competitors for the Premium to send their applications to the Secretary on or before the first day of June next, stating the size and description of the buildings, the different descriptions of machinery they intend and will descriptions of machinery they intend and will descriptions of machinery they intend and will agree to provide and put in operation by the tablishment is intended to be placed.
