YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

The Courier brought in the mail about six o'clock. This shows that the roads are improving. From the papers we make a few selections.

THE EXTRAVAGANCE OF THE ASSEMBLY.—We learn from our contemporary of the Morning News that the Contingent expenses of the Session just closed, amount to the monstrous sum of £1970 and upwards! The public are also furnished with the postage accounts of the various members of the House, varying from 5s. 11d. for Mr Miles of Sonbury, up to £18 14s. 4d. for Mr Charles Connell, of Carleton. We can readily account for the postage of Mr Miles being so small, that hon. member having been ill and absent all the early part of the Session. He did attend the last few weeks of the Session, and doubtless received his full pay for the whole time; but it would have been better for the public interest had he staid away altogether, for he regularly voted against every good and useful measure. For the extravagant postage of many of the members, we hope they will be able to account to their constituents.

When the Journals, which are somewhat in arrear, reach us, we shall take a general review of the gross extravagance, corruption, and utter recklessness of the members of the late Assembly. They are such as never before existed in New Brunswick, and would be almost sufficient, without the many other existing causes of depression, to bring about the ruin of this noble Province. Meantime, we caution all the real friends and well-wishers of New Brunswick to be cautious how they pledge themselves or enter into arrangements for the next general Election, which, if we are correctly informed, is close at hand. Every man who loves his Country should endeavor to make himself master of its present position, and adopt such a course in returning representatives, as will bring about a better order of things, and tend to restore general prosperity.—*St. John New Brunswick, May 4.*

UNITED STATES.—*Frightful accident and Loss of Life.*—New York, Monday, P. M.—Steam tow-boat Princeton, to day, ran down the long boat of the Swedish sloop of war Najaden, containing eight men, five of whom are supposed to have been drowned. The building formerly occupied by the chemical bank in Broadway, now in course of being altered and added to Barnum's Museum, fell in this morning with a frightful crash, burying five men under the ruins, who were rescued and carried to the hospital.

About the same time the side wall of the bonded warehouse, in Water Street, adjoining the ruins of the recent fire, gave way, and thirteen workmen were buried in the ruins. Six were taken out badly injured, and two dead bodies.

Markets.—Flour advanced 2½c. Wheat and Corn firm. Provisions quiet. Freights dull.

Another terrible Steamboat Explosion.—*Thirty or Forty Lives Lost.*—The Cleaveland True Democrat extra, of the 27th, states that the steamer Anthony Wayne blew up, opposite Vermilion, on her passage from Sandusky. The Anthony Wayne arrived at Sandusky with twenty cabin and ten steerage passengers; she then took on twenty four passengers from the railroad train, and had a crew of 19. The whole number on board at the time of the accident is estimated to be eighty four. Thirty passengers were saved and likely to recover. Total passengers missing from 30 to 40.

The counsel in the case of Dr Webster, have taken out a Writ of Error upon the ground that the order of the Municipal Court for certifying the indictment up to the Supreme Court was not fully set forth in the certificate by the clerk of the Municipal Court.

FROM MEXICO.—We have received some other details of the storm which visited the city of Mexico on the 29th March. From midday till 5 o'clock in the evening the hurricane raged with inconceivable fury; walls

were overturned, and 12 large trees in the Alameda were blown down. The streets were filled with debris, and were rendered for a time impassable. At Puebla the effects of the hurricane were less severely felt than at the capital.

The hurricane of the 29th of March did great damage at Orizaba. The crops, fruits and trees in the vicinity were destroyed.

The Indians continued their depredations in the State of Chihuahua.

The cholera had not diminished. It had appeared at Queretaro, within 14 leagues of the capital. In some places, as at Morelia, La Piedad, Silao and La Luz, the hurricane had driven the epidemic away. Thus at La Luz there were on Thursday 50 deaths, on Friday 20, and on Saturday not a single one. At Piedad, containing a population of 3000, about 1000 had died. At many other points, the disease was raging, and in some of them very violent.

Northumberland Agricultural Society.

At a Meeting of the Board of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, held on THURSDAY, the 11th April, 1850, the following Regulations and Restrictions, respecting the erection of a Carding, Fulling and Dressing Machine, for which the Society has offered a Premium of £50, were unanimously adopted:

The object of the Society being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a convenient place in the Parish of Chatham or Newcastle, for the Carding, Fulling, and Dressing the Wool and Cloth produced and made in the County, they will require parties competing for the Premium to provide suitable Buildings, and the necessary Machinery, on the most recent and most approved principles, for Carding, Fulling, and Dressing Wool and Cloth, and on such a scale as will be suitable for the wants of this County at least; to which the Society is desirous that Dyeing should be added. The whole establishment to be completed, and in successful and efficient operation, and answering the purposes for which it is required, on or before the first day of September, 1851.

The competitors for the Premium to send their applications to the Secretary on or before the first day of June next, stating the size and description of the buildings, the different descriptions of machinery they intend and will agree to provide and put in operation by the time limited, and the situation where the establishment is intended to be placed. The Board will determine to which of the applicants the premium shall be given. Immediately after adjudging the Premium, the £50 will be given to the successful competitor, on an approved Joint Note, payable with interest, on the fifteenth day of September, 1851; which Note will be delivered up and cancelled on the Certificate of Alexander Goodfellow, Alexander Jessamine, and John Norman, or any two of them, (who are appointed Judges for that purpose) that the establishment is in full and efficient operation, according to the true intent of the above Regulations. In case of failure the money to be paid back with interest, immediately thereafter.
