In France, in Greece, and in Switzerland, the events are of a grave character, and an aneasy feeling respecting their issue prevails. The antagonism which has so long existed between the Legislative Assembly and the Government of Louis Napo-leon has been expressed by a vote of 335 against 260, leaving the Ministry in a minority of 75 General Changarnier voted with the against 260, leaving the Ministry in a minority of 75 General Changarnier voted with the majority. New troubles have also broken out in Paris. The removal of the trees of hberty planted, as M. Legrange calls it, after the "honorable" revolution of February, has ex-cited the indigation of the populace, and has been made a pretext for fresh tumulis. In the Boulevards and the neighbourhood of Porte St. Martin crowds have nightly assembled, and a collision has taken place with the troops and a collision has taken place with the troops who were called out, in which an officer and some of his men were hurt. General Lamo-riciere, who was by chance on the spot, or sent there by General Cavaignac to see what was going on were reading of the set of the sent there by General Cavaignac to see what was going on, was recognized by the mob, hooted and assaulted. It is plain that he was very roughly handled, and oaly escaped from his assailants by taking refuge in a house, whence he made an ignominicus exit threach the skylight in the roof, and thus probably sa-ved his life. Tranquillity has been for a mo-ment restored, but it is mere self-delusion to expect that it can be permanently memained. It is alleged, and generally credited, that the whole of the south-esstern portion of France is on the verge of an outbreak; and this state of things is mainly attributed to the intrigues and incendiary publications poured intrigues and incendiary publications poured into Franse from Swizerland, whence Boichot and Pyat, and other retugees circulate their stimulating Bocialist doctrines. The Swiss Minister in France denies that the number of reinges in Switzerland exceeds 1500, includ-150 Poles; and ridicules the idea that Aus-tria need maintain an atmy of observation of 600,000 men, and Prussia of 490,000, merely to overawe Switzerland. He says that the federal Government will be strong enough to expel the remaining refugees. Opinions, how-

lederal Government will be strong enough to expel the remaining refogees. Opinions, how-ever, are entertained in many quarters, that Berne and Geneva will be strong enough to oppose this; and Louis Napoleon having him-self been a refugee in Switzerland, finds it a difficult matter to join with Austria and Pros-sia in expelling these men from their last re-fuge on the continent. The public have been startled by the news that the British fleet under Admiral Parker has appeared off the Piraus, to bring King Otho to account, and this miserable potentate had been summended to comply with the demands made by our Minister in twenty four hours, or that we should blockade the ports of Greege as regards vessels of war, and make reprisals. From the explanations made in Parliament by Lord Palmerston, it appears that these proceed-ings have been taken on account of the non-payment of the Greek dividends, but owing to the refusal of the Greek dividends, but owing to for carrain claims due to British subjects which for many years have been pressed upon the Greek authorities. In Berlin the Government, in spite of all



The special articles of the Royal Message have all been carried by decisive majorities—the opposition, instead of totally rejecting, having almost completely sanctioned them.
