From so good a beginning we nave full hope that something really hopeficial. nave full hope that something really beneficial to the interests of this Province will be effected with our sister colonies in the West Indies, with whom, of late years, we have had but little communication.

The House was engaged all day on Thursday in debate on the bill to incorporate the Orange Lodges, which was not concluded. The debate stands adjourned until Tuesday

Yesterday, the state of the Province stood as the order of the day, and it was expected some exciting speeches would be made. It is not pro-bable that the resolutions of Mr Wark or the amendment of Mr Brown would pass the house, but that some other resolutions, pointing out the true position of the Province, would be passed and embodied in an address to the Crown.—St John Courier.

CUSTOMS UNION WITH THE UNITED STATES.—A suggestion made by a gentleman of this city has been transmitted to Washington, and is now under consideration there, for a Customs Union between these Colonies and the United States, somewhat on the principal of the German Zollverein. The proposition is to the effect, that there shall be perfect free trade between these Colonies and the free trade between these Colonies and the American Union in every respect, both countries adopting the same tariff precisely, as against all countries not included in the customs Union. This idea, bold and startling as it may be at the outset, is worthy of consideration.
